Dispatcher E. L. Kelly, produced his train sheet and explained further the system of reporting and issuing orders to trains. The car on the switch at the car barns, it seems, was disabled and was north bound considerably behind its schedule at North Baltimore. Another was run out from the barns upon its time and this was passed by the limited at Maumee. The cripple got into the siding at the barns at 6:35, one minute before orders were issued to Conductor Driscoll of the local to take the car barns siding for the limited. He stated that the orders for the limited car were issued to the agent, Dunbar, at Maumee, and he presumed were transferred by him to the conductor, as is the custom. The presence of the orders in the wrecked car after the accident indicates that this was done.

## TOLEDO BEACH.

Toledo people are busy congratulating themselves on their beautiful new which thousands are flocking daily, not to go bathing of course but to see the beautiful stretch of sand and the magnificent new buildings that have been constructed. As soon as he reached home he took to his bed, and his condition is now very critical.

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
