There is grave question among Speaker Cannon's friends whether the political tactics adopted in his interest in Florida and which resulted in the election of a contesting delegation by a "rump" convention, are wise. It is becoming too obvious that the methods of the Cannon, Fairbanks, Foraker combine mean the absolute elimination of the present Republican organization in all the southern states.

The recent error which occurred in the Millbury precinct whereby the poll books were destroyed, should serve as a lesson to all parties, and especially to committeemen, in the recommendation of men to serve on the local election boards. The taking, counting and recording of the ballots, is too important a matter to be assigned to men who are not thoroughly capable and conversant with the election laws. The appointments are made by the County Board of Elections on the recommendation of the Precinct Central Committeemen and these Committeemen frequently make their recommendations without paying any attention to the ability of the men, but merely as a matter of favoritism. The ballot is too important a matter to be placed in the care of incompetent people and every committeeman should make it his business to see that the local boards of elections should be composed of competent men only. This is a duty that should be looked after by Republicans and Democrats alike.

Cuba must do everything necessary to make her cities sanitary. This is the decision of the President, Secretary Root and Secretary Taft. The issue grew out of a contract for sewerage and paving the city of Havana which the Cubans wish to repudiate because of the expense, but the administration in Washington has decided that the terms of the contract must be carried out. For a time there will doubtless be much muttering and discontent in Cuba, particularly in Havana, but we venture the prediction that no one will be more grateful to the administration, once the work is done, than the people who will complain most loudly now. The history of American occupation of foreign lands has been a history of cleanliness. Americans have cleaned Manila and made it a healthful, beautiful city, and the protests of the people have turned to praise. Americans have changed Panama Canal zone and the chief cities of Panama from pest-holes to healthful, cleanly cities and Panama is reaping a rich reward. The absolute sanitation of Cuba will make for the wealth and prosperity of the Republic, and the money so expended will be returned ten-fold.

If the Wizard Edison has really perfected a storage battery which will do away with the use of gasoline in automobiles there will be rejoicing among ordinary people who have to use the highways—also among the polecats.

In these days of railroad crossing accidents, would it not be well for the village council to look after the crossing on Main street? With C. H. & D. trains passing through town at the rate of 40 miles per hour, it would seem that as a matter of protection to our citizens, who pass along that street several times a day, a gate and watchman should be placed at that crossing. Will the council kindly make a note of this fact and give this protection to the people?

There occurred recently in Washington a memorial service to a Roman Catholic priest, the late Father D. J. Stafford, in which the principal speakers were Rev. Dr. Van Schaik of the German Reformed church; the President's pastor, the Rev. Abram Simon, Rabbi of the Jewish Synagogue, "Corporal" Tanner, a non-Catholic and Senator Beveridge, also a non-Catholic, besides a Catholic priest, the assistant of the deceased clergyman. Truly the era of Christian charity and true brotherly love is at hand when leading men of all denominations thus gather to do honor to a simple Roman priest.

The attempt of Senator Foraker to prove his charge that federal patronage was being used to effect Mr. Taft's nomination was as pitiable as it was futile. The only case he was able to cite was that of the postmaster at Athens, Ohio, who, according to Congressman Douglas who endorsed him, had wilfully sought to injure the President, and who had declared that he was opposed to Mr. Taft's nomination. Nevertheless, the President nominated him postmaster of Athens and the Senate confirmed him on January 7. It is indeed a sad spectacle to see a man who has enjoyed the reputation which has been Mr. Foraker's stoop to the pusillanimous methods he has this year adopted.
