

ORDINANCE NO. 254.

Determining to proceed with the Improvement of Louisiana Avenue from the south curb line of Front Street to the south line of Sixth Street, by grading, draining, curbing and paving.

Be it Ordained by the Council of the Village of Perrysburg, State of Ohio, (three-fourths of the whole number elected thereto concurring), as follows:—

Section 1. That it is the intention of the Council and it hereby determines to proceed with the Improvement of Louisiana Avenue in said Village of Perrysburg from the south curb line of Front Street to the south line of Sixth Street, in the manner following, to-wit:—

(A) That part from the south curb line of Front Street to the south curb line of Third Street by grading, draining and curbing with sandstone or concrete curbing, and paving the center Eighty (80) feet with vitrified paving brick or concrete pavement, and

(B) That part from the south curb line of Third Street to the south curb line of Indiana Avenue, by grading, draining, and curbing with sandstone or concrete curbing, and paving the center Sixty (60) feet with vitrified paving brick or concrete pavement, and

(C) That part from the south curb line of Indiana Avenue to the south line of Sixth Street, by grading, draining, and curbing with sandstone or concrete curbing, and paving the center Forty-five (45) feet with vitrified paving brick or concrete pavement; excepting however therefrom, throughout the entire length and between and including the center of said improvement a strip of pavement of the tracks of the Toledo and Maumee Valley Railway Company, from the center and Fremont Railway Company, from the center of the ties across and over said tracks; the width of said improvement to be provided for the necessary catch-basins, and for the ends of the ties across and over said tracks, and all in accordance with Resolution No. 246, duly passed by the Council on March 26, 1908.

Section 2. That the plans, specifications, estimates and profiles heretofore approved and now on file in the office of the Clerk of said village

shall be and they are hereby authorized and directed to make and execute a contract for and on behalf of said village with the lowest and best bidder, after advertisement, according to law.

Section 3. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.
