From the best information I have from his nephew, J. Fawcett Larwill, of Wooster, Ohio, from whom I obtained it, this map was made with a quill pen.

Mr. Joseph H. Larwell was a neighbor of mine for many years. He was born in England and died at Wooster, November 27th, 1867.

This map was purchased by me for the purpose of presenting it to your association, but I make the reservation in its presentation that from now on until your association would have a proper place for its preservation. I would deposit it with the Toledo Museum of Art, who should be the custodian until such time should arrive.

MANY GOING TO CIRCUS. Ringling Bros. Expected to Draw Crowds from Wood County.

The case was continued until Monday, James Timmons, his brother Alvin, and Alvin Fralick are under indictment for several offenses committed during the past six months, and this is the first case tried. The case was given to the jury at 5:15 p. m. Monday night, and they returned a verdict of guilty of larceny.

Alvin Fralick was up in probate court on Monday on a lunacy affidavit. Alvin is charged with various crimes and is under indictment under five different counts for burglary and for larceny.

Some time ago Alvin was taken to New York to be examined by expert alienists there, and it was stated on the stand Monday that these alienists pronounced him insane. Four physicians, Dr. Stitt, of Rising Sun, and Doctors St. John, McKendree and Trichler of this city, all testified that they believed him insane. Fralick's father and mother also testified to his insanity, reciting instances during his life time which indicated the same; also referring to relatives who were weak mentally.

To a point on said south side of said Front Street, Fifty-five (55) feet easterly from said line between said Out Lots numbers One and Twenty-six, and in front of the East 16 feet of Out Lot No. 1 and the West quarter of Out Lot No. 26 in said Village of Perrysburg, Wood County, Ohio, of the character and in the manner following:—Said sidewalk shall be Seventy-one (71) feet long and Six (6) feet wide, and shall be constructed of concrete, Four (4) inches in thickness and upon a suitable bed of cinders, Six (6) inches in depth, or said sidewalk shall be constructed of stone, Two (2) inches in thickness, and shall be laid upon a suitable bed of cinders Six (6) inches in depth, and said sidewalk shall be constructed and laid in accordance with the sidewalk line and the sidewalk grade of said Front Street, and shall be laid and constructed under the supervision of the Street Commissioner.
