CANDIDATES FOR SENATOR.

S. W. Nigh of North Baltimore, has announced that he will be a candidate for the nomination of State Senator according to the judgment of the Republican voters of Wood county. Mr. Nigh and C. R. Painter, of Bowling Green, are the only known candidates for the honors in Wood county. They may come to some agreement which will give the county but one candidate when the 33rd district senatorial convention is held at Bowling Green in July. Hancock county will have a candidate and Henry county will present one of her sons.

COURT HOUSE CULLINGS

Strange Family Mix-Up and other Legal Matters.

In the matter of the estate of Joseph Holmes admr of the estate of Leander Stanton. Exceptions to final account sustained, found and ordered:—1st that Charlotta Hitchcock is a child and an heir at law of Leander Stanton. 2nd that Jennie Wade-Stanton is not the widow of Leander Stanton and not entitled to dower and year's allowance. 3rd that the several accounts be opened and admr charge himself with amounts paid to Jennie Wade-Stanton and so charging the balance in his hands is \$1647 14 for which he must account. That the admr pay the cost herein. Motion for new trial overruled. Findings and order certified to Probate Court.

Joseph Holmes, admr vs Jennie Stanton, et al. Finding and ordered as follows: 1st that Jennie Stanton is not widow of Leander Stanton and not entitled to dower and years support. 2nd that Charlotta Hitchcock is and was an heir at law of Leander Stanton and is entitled to share in his estate. 3rd that the assets exceeded the debts estate at the time of the filing of the petition by the admr and the order of sale, the sale itself and its confirmation were improvidently and wrongfully made and are now and here set aside and vacated. 4th that the petition to sell real estate is dismissed, the admr to pay costs. Motion for new trial overruled. Order and finding certified to Probate court.

Trouble Over Franchise in City is now Settled.

Concerning the franchise muddle of the Toledo, Fostoria & Findlay electric line, yesterday filed a check for the \$1000 00 in payment for the franchise allowed his company on Monday night. He also brought to the city hall a deed for property to allow for a new alley in place of one over which the tracks of his line will run. His action was taken as formal acceptance of the conditions of the franchise. As soon as Acting Mayor A. A. Moody signs the ordinance, which will probably be to day, the T. F. & F. company will make its connections with the city line on Woodville street and the interurban passengers coming in over the line will not be compelled to walk 40 rods to make connections.

TOOK THE MONEY

And Went Away on a Short Vacation Trip.

Sheriff Roach went to Birmingham near Norwalk, Sunday and brought back with him Virgil Miller, aged sixteen, charged with having stolen \$45 in money and a revolver from Gus Rudolph near Tontogany, a week ago. The sheriff of Erie county found the boy on a boat, taking a ride and enjoying the breezes. The youngster had but \$11 in his pockets.

The boy was sent to Rudolph by Humane Officer Ware of Toledo, and he seemed to be a boy of trust. Sunday, June 14, the people all went away leaving Miller in charge of the house. When they returned the boy, money and revolver were missing. His parents are dead and he once lived in the section where he was arrested.

As he is under seventeen years of age he has been turned over to the juvenile court.

STRUCK BY LIGHTNING

Old Indian Tree Split by Electric Current.

The old Indian Elm, at Maumee, was struck by lightning on Sunday and split asunder.

The old elm stands upon the bank of the Maumee river, high upon a hill, and is said to have provided a point of eminence from which an Indian with a long range rifle picked off the men of the garrison of Fort Meigs as they went from the fort to the river for water.

The hiding place of the Indian was finally discovered and a Kentucky sharp shooter soon picked him off.

A large piece of wood placed in a crotch of the tree some distance from the ground is said to have provided a seat for the Indian.

A story to the effect that the Indian story is not true and that the block of wood was placed in the tree to provide a resting place for a flag staff has often been told but this is not generally believed. Most people prefer to remember the old tree as the Old Indian Elm.
