E. church and in the early days when the ministers made their homes with the members of the church their home was the regular stopping place of the pastor, and thus her whole life has been identified with the church. She was a faithful and devoted mother, a good neighbor, and a consistent Christian woman, who will be greatly missed by many friends, while her family have the deep sympathy of all in their great bereavement.

SAD AFFLICTION

Two Members of One Family Buried At One Time.

Monday afternoon at Dunbridge occurred a double funeral, that of Mrs. Jacob Lintner who died Friday night at the Toledo hospital following an operation for cancer and that of Harold Apel aged ten who was killed in an accident in Dunbridge Saturday afternoon. Both were the children of Geo. Apel, Sr., of Dunbridge.

The boy's death was unusually tragic. Mr. Apel was threshing and the boy went with the driver of the water tank wagon for a tank of water. Returning, the axle of the wagon broke as it was crossing a bridge over a deep ditch and the entire outfit, horses, tank of water, wagon, driver and the little boy who was riding on the tank were thrown into the ditch. The boy was caught beneath the wheel of the wagon, and was killed instantly. His neck was broken, his jaw was also broken and he suffered other injuries. The team fell upon a pipe line which crosses the ditch and was thus prevented from being caught beneath the wagon. The bridge was smooth and why the wagon axle should happen to break on the bridge is unexplainable.

Mrs. Lintner lived near Lucke and had been ill for some months. As the only means of relief she submitted to an operation at the Toledo hospital two days before her death. Mr and Mrs. Apel have the deepest sympathy of all the people of Dunbridge and surrounding country.

The funeral services were conducted by Rev. M. L. Donahey and interment was at Dowling cemetery.—Sentinel.
