& Atlantic R. R. in Georgia in April, 1862, on which occasion our own Wilson W. Brown and the late Alf. Wilson were the engineer and fireman of the locomotive; photo of Mrs. Surratt's grave in Mt. Olivet cemetery at Washington; photo of the Marshall House, Alexandria, Va., where Col. Elmer Ellsworth was killed on the morning of May 24, 1861, after hauling down a Rebel flag; a series of War Department pictures of Fort Sumter after the bombardment of April 12, 1861; Libby Prison and the old State House at Richmond, Va.; pictures of J. Wilkes Booth and the other assassins of President Lincoln; a fine collection of Rebel money, and swords, sabers and pistols used during the war of the Rebellion; also the original list of signatures of those who volunteered to enter the military service of the United States in Perrysburg on April 17, 1861, on the first call for troops after the flag had been fired upon; also a collection of bullets, cannon balls, shells, etc., found on historic Fort Meigs. Alf J. Witzler has on exhibition in his show window also a very fine collection of curios and pictures consisting of a series of War Department pictures of Fort Moultrie in Charleston Harbor, South Carolina, as it appeared during the war; a series of 28 pictures of the Rebel defenses and breastworks in the vicinity of Atlanta, Ga., picture of the famous Potter House at Atlanta showing the effects of the bombardment by the Union troops; pictures of important points fortified by the Rebels in the vicinity of Chattanooga; muskets, knapsacks, belts and swords used in the war of the Rebellion; a collection of Rebel money composed of bills issued by nearly all of the seceding States; a musket and belt, revolver and holster, and a powder flask and other articles used during the Mexican war; also a large collection of Indian relics and curiosities such as arrow heads, tomahawks, knives, and other articles of Indian warfare, etc., found around Fort Meigs, Turkey-foot Rock, Fallen Timbers, and other Indian gathering places in the vicinity of Perrysburg. Both of these exhibits are out of the ordinary, and are worth seeing.
