TUBERCULOSIS

Monster Exhibit to be Held in New York City.

By November 15th the greatest exhibition on tuberculosis that has ever been gathered will be opened to the public in New York City. The exhibit, which formed part of the recent International Congress on Tuberculosis, will be shown under the auspices of the Tuberculosis Committee of the Charity Organization Society, and

the Department of Health.

The Exhibition consists of charts, photographs, maps, models, diagrams, and all sorts of paraphernalia that have to do with the prevention, study, or treatment of tuberculosis. Exhibits are shown from 15 different countries, and from 200 associations and individuals. All in all, the exhibition includes nearly 5,000 units. It will take 50,000 square feet of floor space and 110,000 square feet of wall space for the display of the exhibition. Ten special cars and over 1,200 packing cases are required to transport it.

During its three weeks' stay in Washington, this exhibit was viewed by fully 200,000 people. The exhibit of the Charity Organization Society, which forms but one small unit of this entire exhibition, has been viewed by over a half-million people in New York City. From these figures and a comparison with the attendance of similar exhibitions, it is estimated by the authorities in charge of the present exhibit, that probably over a million people will see this educational display while it is in New York City.

The exhibit, as it will be shown in New York City, is unique, not only in the fact that it is the greatest of its kind ever gathered together, but also, because this demonstration, collected for a purely educational purpose, is used to illustrate the dangers of only one disease. The entire exhibition publishes and carries but one message, that consumption can be cured, and that the cure for the disease is fresh air, rest and wholesome food. These simple facts are emphasized in every conceivable way. Charts and diagrams show the fearful ravages of tuberculosis in various parts of the world. In the German exhibit, a series of small painted wooden pillars and blocks of different heights, demonstrate the comparative mortality from consumption in various groups of the people. The United States Census Bureau shows the deaths from tuberculosis in a unique way, indicating by a flash of

LATER RETURNS FAVOR HARMON

AND IT IS CERTAIN THAT HE HAS BEEN ELECTED GOVERNOR OF OHIO.

TAFT WINS WEST VIRGINIA.

Indiana Gave Taft About 8,000 Plurality, but Democrats Won State Ticket and Gained Seven Congressmen.

New York, Nov. 5.—Practically complete returns indicate that William H. Taft, as president-elect, will have a vote of 309 in the electoral college. This is within 16 votes of the forecast made by National Chairman Hitchcock and 67 more than a majority of the total electoral vote of 483.

The most important of the late returns indicate that Maryland has been swung into the Taft column. The unofficial figures give Mr. Taft the state by 149 votes.

Maryland was the last of the doubtful states to be heard from. Indiana and West Virginia, as well as Montana, turned out to be safely Republican. Colorado went for Bryan.

Mr. Bryan has a total of 174 votes, two less than he received in 1896. In 1904 Mr. Parker received only 140 votes, in 1900 Mr. Bryan received 155 votes and in 1896 the Nebraskan received 176 votes.

The states carried by Mr. Bryan are as follows: Alabama 11, Arkansas 5, Colorado 5, Florida 5, Georgia 13, Kentucky 13, Louisiana 9, Mississippi 10, Missouri 18, Nevada 3, Nebraska 8, North Carolina 12, Oklahoma 7, South Carolina 9, Tennessee 12, Texas 18 and Virginia 12. Total 174. All the rest of the states are safe for Taft with the exception of Maryland, where the issue is so close that an official count may be necessary to finally determine the result.

Mr. Taft's 309 electoral votes compare with 336 received by Roosevelt in 1904, 292 received by McKinley in 1900 and 271 received by McKinley in 1896.

The latest returns indicate that in the national house of representatives the Republicans will have 208 members and the Democrats 172, with 11 districts missing.

Taft's plurality in the state of New York is 203,495, more than 25,000 in excess of Roosevelt's plurality of four years ago. Gov. Charles E. Hughes was re-elected in New York state by 71,150.

OHIO.

Cincinnati.—A plurality of about 50,000 for Judge Taft, the Republican candidate for president, was the election day expression of the voters of Ohio, who, however, at the same time chose the head of the opposition state ticket by a plurality of probably 20,000. More than half the precincts of the state are included in the figures that show these results, no estimates being considered, and any later difference will be simply as to the size of the plurality, there being no question of the certainty of the result.

Columbus.—Latest returns show that Carl Anderson, Democrat, has beaten Congressman Grant E. Mouser in the Thirteenth district by about 2,000 votes. This makes a gain of four congressmen in Ohio for the Democrats. The delegation will stand 12 Republicans to nine Democrats.

The election of a Republican to succeed Joseph B. Foraker to the United States senate is assured by returns indicating that the Republicans have carried the general assembly by a substantial joint majority. A proposed amendment to the constitution providing for a session of the legislature in January next failed of passage. When this became known, it was said that the Democratic governor-elect, Judson Harmon, would have the opportunity to name a senator to serve from the expiration of Senator Foraker's term in March next until the following January, when the next regular session of the assembly would be held. However, it was disclosed Wednesday that the Republicans plan to ask Gov. Harris to call a special session before Mr. Harmon's term begins, for the selection of Foraker's successor. This could be called since the term of the legislature begins January 1, ten days before that of the new governor. A special session some time during January is considered essential, because of the expiration of appropriations.

Senator Henry M. Williams of the Republican state executive committee issued a statement Wednesday night conceding the defeat of Gov. Harris, but gave no figures. He said: "Returns from all but ten counties, four of which are Democratic, indicate the defeat of Gov. Harris by a small plurality, but the election of all other candidates on the state ticket by comfortable figures, while both branches of the legislature are Republican."

According to a dispatch from Cambridge, George White, Democrat, con-

cedes the election of James Joyce, Republican, to congress in the Fifteenth district by 52. Congressman Albert Douglas, Republican, telephoned to Columbus that he had carried the Eleventh district by 1,200.

MONTANA.

Butte.—Advices from throughout Montana indicate that Taft carried the state by 3,000 votes. Charles N. Pray, Republican, is re-elected to congress by about 4,000. The governorship is still in doubt.

OKLAHOMA.

Oklahoma City.—Complete returns from 40 counties in central and northern Oklahoma, received by Chairman Thompson of the Democratic state central committee, give Bryan a plurality of 13,000. The counties yet to be heard from are largely Democratic. These probably will increase Bryan's plurality to 18,000.

Unofficial complete returns from 40 counties and partial returns from the 35 other counties indicate that the legislature will be composed of 110 Democrats and 43 Republicans. This is a gain of 25 for the Republicans, but the defeat of United States Senator Gore is not threatened.

Marked gains were made by the Socialists. The party's vote in Oklahoma last year was about 10,000. This year's returns may increase those figures to 17,000.

NEW JERSEY.

Trenton.—Revised returns give Taft a plurality in New Jersey of about 70,000. These figures, as the later returns come in, may possibly be increased to meet the plurality given Roosevelt four years ago, which was 80,598.

One of the surprises of the returns was the small plurality given Mr. Bryan in Hudson county. Unofficial figures place the plurality at 1,700. Four years ago Parker had 1,338. This year Kinkead and Hamill, Democratic candidates for congress in the Ninth and Tenth district, which comprise Hudson county, carried the county by combined pluralities of 14,500.

Essex county, the home of ex-United States Senator Smith, gives Taft about 23,000 plurality. Roosevelt carried the county four years ago by 25,068.

COLORADO.

Denver.—Estimated pluralities by counties, based on incomplete returns, indicate that Bryan and the entire Democratic state ticket, headed by John F. Shafroth for governor, carried Colorado with pluralities in the neighborhood of 5,000. The Democrats probably will control the legislature by a narrow margin, insuring the election of Charles J. Hughes, jr., as United States senator to succeed Senator Teller, Hughes having been endorsed for the position by the state convention.

Results of the congressional elections are not positively known, but indications favor Edward M. Taylor, Democrat, in the state at large, Robert W. Bonyng, Republican, in the First district and John A. Martin, Democrat, in the Second district.

WEST VIRGINIA.

Wheeling.—While fuller figures Wednesday showed that Taft had carried West Virginia by a safe plurality of several thousand, the state ticket may not have gone through with him, Bennett, Democrat for governor, having the better of the argument in probably half the state. On these figures Bennett had more than 1,000 plurality, but the figure was so small that the Republicans found satisfaction in the possible overturning of that amount and they claimed the entire state ticket.

DELAWARE.

Wilmington.—The returns from rural New Castle county and from Kent and Sussex, the two lower counties in Delaware, are unusually slow in coming in, but enough information has been received to show that the entire Republican state ticket, with the exception of Davis for attorney general, has been elected. Gray, Democrat, for the latter office has probably been chosen by 2,000 plurality. Both parties claim the legislature.

CALIFORNIA.

San Francisco.—California probably gave Taft a plurality of more than 60,000 votes and in addition re-elected all eight Republican congressmen and chose a Republican legislature. Judge Frank H. Dunne was the only Democratic judge elected in San Francisco and he was victorious in spite of a vigorous campaign against him by those who objected to his rulings while trying the Ruff and Schmitz graft cases.

TEXAS.

Dallas.—Almost complete returns from Tuesday's election show the usual overwhelming majority in favor of the Democratic ticket, both state and national. A resolution adopted by the Democratic state convention instructs the legislature to submit to a vote of the people at a future election a constitutional amendment providing for state wide prohibition.

MINNESOTA.

St. Paul.—It is conceded by all parties that John A. Johnson has been re-elected governor. The St. Paul Dispatch, Republican, concedes Johnson's election over Jacobson by a majority of from 10,000 to 12,000.
