**SOME BIG CORN.**

Tobias Kibler, residing four miles southwest of Bowling Green, brought some real Wood county corn into the office this morning. The stalk is over ten feet high, and bears two ears of corn—one measuring 16 inches and the other 14 inches. The corn was planted June first, and is well matured. The seed is of a new variety, brought by Mr. Kibler from Allentown, Pa., but Wood county soil, rather than Allentown seed, deserves the major part of the credit. Wood county farmers can't help raising big corn.—Sentinel.

The Sentinel office can be excused for their enthusiasm over Mr. Kibler's corn because those editors never lived in Perrysburg and have never heard of the corn raised on Garden Island years ago, as related by a good friend of ours, now deceased, who gave us positive proof that the corn he raised on the island was all 18 feet and over in height and at each of the joints there was an ear of corn 18 inches in length and in the tassel at the top of the stalk there was a gourd which contained a peck of shelled corn. The stalks were so large and strong that it required the use of a portable saw mill to cut them. The soil on which this corn was raised was so fertile that when he planted pumpkins the vines grew so strong and fast that they dragged the pumpkins over the field so rapidly that it was necessary to "half-sole" the pumpkins to prevent holes being worn in their sides.

And these are facts.

**WAS NOT HIS WIFE**

Death Revealed the Truth To This Woman.

The case of Jennie Stanton vs. Joseph A. Holmes as administrator of the estate of Leander S. Stanton, deceased and Charlotte Victoria Hitchcock, first filed in the common pleas court of Wood county, was transferred Friday to the federal circuit court at Toledo. Charlotte Hitchcock is not a resident of the state.

The case has been fought through the Wood county courts for three years.

The plaintiff states that she married Leander Stanton in 1893, he having represented himself to be an unmarried man, and that upon his death in 1905 it was found he had another wife by a former marriage in 1855, living in Pennsylvania, from whom he was never divorced. Charlotte Victoria Hitchcock, a daughter of Stanton, appeared in Wood county after his death and proved her claim to the dead man's estate.

The plaintiff puts in an itemized bill for nursing and for money spent in taxes and farm improvements, amounting to \$2,194.78 and interest, also for \$2,000 damages for humiliation.
