OBITUARY.

Johe Kopp died September 25th, 1909, aged 77 years, 5 mo., and 10 days.

Deceased was born April 15th, 1832 in Buchenberg, Baden, Germany. When twenty years of age, he immigrated to this country. In 1855, at Ellenville, N. Y., he married Miss Margaret Wecht. This union was blessed with eight children, of whom six, three sons and three daughters, are still living. From Ellenville Mr. Kopp moved to Loudenville, O., thence, in 1872, to Wood county, where he settled on the farm. In 1889 his wife died. The last years of his life he made his home with Mrs. George Kazmaier, his daughter, in Perrysburg. He was a life-long, faithful member of the Evangelical Lutheran church. His many bodily ailments he bore with Christian resignation. His prayer for deliverance from all evil was granted on Saturday last, at half past 3 o'clock in the morning. There live to mourn his departure, a brother, 6 children, 33 grand-children, and 7 great grand-children.
