## DEATH OF MRS. LAWRENCE.

The death of Mrs. H. C. Lawrence occurred on Saturday evening, May 7, 1910, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. D. A. Haylor, in Bowling Green, and the remains were brought to her late home in Perrysburg, where the funeral services were conducted on Tuesday afternoon by Rev. G. W. Lowry.

Deceased was the widow of H. C. Lawrence, a prominent citizen of the town, whose death occurred about 20 years ago.

She had been a member of the Presbyterian church for many years, and was an earnest worker in the church.

During the past six months she had resided with her daughter, Mrs. Riddle, on the Isthmus of Panama, and returned to her home here a few weeks since and her death occurred while visiting at the home of her daughter in Bowling Green, of heart failure.

In the death of Mrs. Lawrence Perrysburg loses one of her best known and most highly respected ladies; the church a devout christian member; her host of acquaintances, a true friend, and her family a devoted, loving mother.

She was ever ready to do a kind act for a neighbor and to assist in any manner that would lighten the burden of the unfortunate, and her death is deeply regretted and her memory will long be cherished by all who knew her.

She leaves a family consisting of Mrs. Dr. Cole of Chicago; Mrs. Helen Riddle of Panama; Mrs. C. D. Miller of Grand Rapids, Mich.; Mrs. Frank Rider of Lima City; Mrs. Dr. Brown of Bloomington, Ill.; Mrs. D. A. Haylor of Bowling Green, and Mrs. S. A. Thompson of Toledo, who have the sympathy of many friends in their bereavement. Her only son, Charles, died about 10 years ago.
