The recent Legislature enacted a law creating a State Board of optometry. The Board is to consist of five members and is to be appointed by the governor. It provides that persons to fit glasses to the eyes must be qualified by education and experience. The board is to hold stated meetings and an examination fee of \$20 is to be charged. Persons engaged in business two years prior to the enactment of the law are entitled to continue without taking an examination, but they must secure a certificate from the state board, for which they shall pay a fee of \$5. The purpose of the bill is to shut out vendors in spectacles, who travel about over the country and measure the peoples eyes for glasses, with no knowledge of optometry.

You can see for yourself that the facts disprove his absurd statements. He may appear to be my former husband, but I, with my knowledge of myself and my distinct recollection of the past, know him for a delusion on the part of the world in general, a permissible mistake, I admit, but nevertheless a mere mirage, and nothing more."
