—Forty thousand rural letter carriers throughout the country will receive increased salaries beginning July 1 next, under the terms of an amendment incorporated in the post office appropriation bill which was passed by the house. Carriers on standard routes of 25 miles and over will each receive increases of \$100, thus giving them \$1,000 instead of \$900 a year as at present. Carriers on routes of less than 25 miles in length are allowed proportionate increases, according to the number of miles traveled.
