

ALFALFA CAMPAIGN SPREADING RAPIDLY

Auto Carrying Instruction Directly to the Field

Growing of Alfalfa is Made Possible on Every Farm in the Corn Belt

Within the past week the first automobile alfalfa campaign the world has ever known was carried on in Kent County, Michigan, by the recently organized Kent County Alfalfa Growers' Association. The big "Automobile Special," in direct charge of the Grand Rapids Association of Commerce, was marked as the initial effort of the Agricultural Extension Department of the International Harvester Company of New Jersey to carry out their avowed purpose of establishing alfalfa on every farm in the Corn Belt. Professor Perry G. Holden, the well-known Iowa corn expert, whose services were recently secured by that company, and Federal Agent J. H. Skinner of the United States Department of Agriculture, were the chief missionaries of this wonderfully profitable but sadly

neglected forage crop. A systematic canvass from farm to farm, grange to grange, and oftentimes from field to field was made in an effort to bring to the farmer in his own home the facts and figures which have been stored up in the pamphlets and archives of the agricultural schools and colleges.

Taking part in the campaign, either in an advisory capacity or as speakers, were the following members of the Agricultural Extension Department: C. M. Carroll, formerly with the Crop Improvement Committee; W. R. Baughman, a prominent rancher and alfalfa grower of Texas; J. E. Waggoner, formerly of the Mississippi Agricultural College; R. W. Lamson of Iowa; J. E. Buck of Chicago; C. W. Farr, assistant county superintendent of Cook County, Illinois; the Hon. G. H. Alford of Georgia, and C. H. Allen, a retired banker of Ohio.

That the farmers were ready for the blessings which alfalfa strews over a neighborhood which gives it a neighborly welcome, was evidenced everywhere by the crowds that greeted the campaigners at every stop. At no time were any of the speakers without an encouraging audience, and on some occasions the party was obliged to divide, a part addressing the school children while others spoke to the farmers. The advent of the cortege into a community was made Alfalfa Day in the schools. In the towns the children paraded out to meet the autos, singing special alfalfa songs and waving flags. It is estimated that between three and four hundred farmers in that one county alone pledged themselves to make a start with alfalfa and do it according to the rules laid down by Federal Expert J. H. Skinner.

Kent County, in the census of 1910, was credited with raising only 73 acres of alfalfa, but indications at the present time are that by 1915 there will be 10,000 acres flourishing with this legume. It was shown that on the typical sand or clay loams east of the Mississippi alfalfa could be raised as easily and as surely as clover yielding three crops a season and that it was the greatest plant the farm world has yet discovered for extracting nitrogen from the air and storing it up in the soil, thus rejuvenating run down and over-cropped farms.

The Corn Belt farmer in alarm at his annually diminishing yields, is turning to alfalfa as his one great hope, and the bugle call sounded in Kent County is re-echoing in the entire eastern states. As we go to press, a similar campaign is going on in Allegan County, Michigan; the Toledo Commercial Club is about to wage a powerful alfalfa propaganda in the ten western counties of Ohio. Feelers have been put out by the Connecticut agriculturists for turning the entire I H C Agricultural Extension Department batteries on that state for a state-wide campaign to introduce alfalfa on the seaboard. Its possibilities seem to be unlimited, and the prospects are that by the next census the leadership in alfalfa acreage and production may be wrested from the western states and the crown placed upon the brow of the middle west and eastern farmer.

AN ORDINANCE

Adopting, confirming and levying the assessments made on account of the improvement of Louisiana Avenue in the Village of Perrysburg, Ohio.

WHEREAS on February 25, 1913, the estimating board heretofore appointed by the Council for that purpose did report to this Council an estimated assessment of a part of the cost of the improvement of Louisiana Avenue from Front Street to Indiana Avenue upon the lots and lands charged therewith, in proportion to the benefits which may result from such improvement, a copy of which assessment was thereupon filed in the office of the Clerk of the Corporation for public inspection; and WHEREAS, the Council has published notice for three weeks consecutively in the Perrysburg Journal that such assessment has been made, and that it is on file in the office of the Clerk for the inspection and examination of persons interested therein; and WHEREAS, more than two weeks have passed since the expiration of such notice and no person has filed any objections to any of said assessments; Now Therefore,

Be it ordained by the Council of the Village of Perrysburg, State of Ohio:

Sec. 1. That the assessments as reported by said estimating board be and the same hereby are adopted, confirmed and levied upon the several lots and parcels of lots or lands, as shown in said report.

Sec. 2. That the Clerk of Council be and he is hereby directed to record said report and assessments upon the proper records in his office.

Sec. 3. Said assessments shall be payable in ten equal annual installments, the first installment to be paid with the taxes for the year 1913, and one installment with the taxes of each year thereafter until all said installments are paid. Provided, that the date of passage of this ordinance shall have the right to pay his assessments in full within thirty days after the date of passage of this ordinance, on all assessments so paid in full a deduction or discount of twenty-three per cent shall be made from the amount having been included in said assessment for interest on deferred payments.

Sec. 4. That the Clerk of the Council, September, each year, shall certify to the County Auditor of Wood County, Ohio, the assessments as herein provided in full, stating the amounts and the time of payment.

Sec. 5. This ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure and shall take effect and be in force from and after the expiration of ten days after the first publication thereof.

ORDINANCE

Adopting, confirming and levying the assessments made on account of the construction of lateral sewers in subdivision number one (1) of sewer district number two (2) in the Village of Perrysburg, Ohio.

Whereas on March 25, 1913, the estimating board heretofore appointed by the Council for that purpose did report to this Council an estimated assessment of the cost of lateral sewers in subdivision number one (1) of sewer district number two (2) upon the lots and lands to be charged therewith in proportion to the benefits which may result from such improvement. A copy of such assessment was thereupon filed in the office of the Village Clerk for public inspection; and WHEREAS, the Council has published notice for three consecutive weeks in the Perrysburg Journal that such assessments had been made and that it is on file in the office of the Clerk for the inspection and examination of persons interested therein; and WHEREAS, more than two weeks have passed since the expiration of such notice and no person has filed any objection to any of said assessments; Now Therefore,

Be it ordained by the Council of the Village of Perrysburg, State of Ohio:

Sec. (1). That the assessments as reported by said estimating board be and the same are hereby adopted, confirmed and levied upon the lots and lands as shown in said report.

Sec. (2). That the Clerk of Council be and he is hereby directed to record said report and assessments upon the proper records in his office.

Sec. (3). Said assessments shall be payable in thirty days of the final passage of this ordinance or in two equal annual installments with interest at the rate of six percent (6%) per annum on deferred payments the first installment to be paid with the taxes for the year 1913, and one thereafter.

Sec. (4). That the Clerk of Council shall on or before the second Monday in September each year certify to the County Auditor of Wood County such assessments as have not been paid in full, stating the amount and time of payment.

Sec. (5). This ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure and shall take effect and be in force from and after the expiration of ten days after the first publication thereof.

1. Commencing at the point where the center line of the Toledo and Perrysburg wagon road, usually called the River road, intersects the west line of lot number three (3) of Kinderhook's Subdivision of River Tract number seventy-five (75); running thence in a northerly course along the center line of said River road, eighty-nine (89) feet; running thence in a northwesterly direction and at right angles to the center line of said River road, one hundred and eighteen (118) feet to a point in the west line of said lot number three (3) in said Kinderhook's Subdivision; running thence south along the west line of said lot number three (3), one hundred and forty-seven and six-tenths (147.6) feet to the place of beginning.

2.
