CAPTURE BOOZE JOINT.

Sheriff Hoald and Deputies Skibbie and Shoecraft went to Waldridge Saturday afternoon armed with a search and seizure warrant and arrested, Chas. Dart, aged 41, a bachelor, on the charge of violation of the liquor laws. The officers state that they found in Dart's house four cases of beer and a tubful of the same beverage on ice, while in a nearby shed were ten empty cases; also a quart of whiskey one-third full. Dart was given a hearing Saturday before Probate Judge C. R. Nearing. He pleaded guilty to two charges. For keeping a place where liquor is sold, he was fined \$100 and costs. He is to stand committed to the Toledo workhouse until same are paid but hopes to secure someone to put up the money for him.


