RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED

At Tri-Township Sunday School Association Meeting.

At a meeting of the Tri-Township Sunday School Association, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted and ordered published in the Perrysburg Journal:

Whereas, For the purpose of suppressing the illicit importation of liquors into dry territory in our state, the temperance sentiment of the state have drafted an amendment to be submitted to the voters of the state at the coming November election, prohibiting such importation of liquors into dry territory; and

Whereas, Under the lead of the liquor interests of the state an amendment of the constitution is to be submitted by them to the voters of the state reducing the size of the Legislative Assembly fully one-half, thereby in its enactment depriving the rural community of their protection; therefore be it

Resolved, That we, The Tri-Township Sunday School Association, now in session in Stony Ridge, Ohio, do urgently request all voters irrespective of party affiliation, to vote for and support the amendment against the importation of liquors into dry territory; and we do just as urgently request the same voters to oppose and vote against the amendment calling for the reduction in number of the representatives composing our General Assembly.

BROWN ACQUITTED

Lack of Evidence Acquits Toledo Man of Robbery Charge.

The case of Kirk Brown, charged with robbery in connection with the Portage bank blowing, was called for trial on Monday.

The state was represented by Prosecuting Attorney Hatfield assisted by ex-Judge Fress, while McClelland & Bowman represented the defense.

Witnesses for the defense were Loss Welliver, one of the bank robbers, Wm. Volmyer, W. H. McIntire, Chief of Police Perry Knapp of the Toledo force, Detectives Henry Herbert, John Caren and Wm. Delahanty of Toledo, and S. L. Stiles, chief of the Pinkerton Bureau in Cleveland. Witnesses for the plaintiff, Wm. Miley confessed bank robber who peached on the rest of the gang, G. C. Munn, the owner of the bank that was robbed, I. I. Freyman, cashier of the bank and Chief of Police Reed, of Bowling Green.

Judge Duncan, of Findlay, was on the bench.

The case was brought to an early conclusion when Judge Duncan ordered the acquittal of Brown.

Insufficient evidence caused the court to grant the motion of the defense for acquittal.

YEGGMEN MAKE ESCAPE

Followed by Bullets of Plucky Citizens of Prairie Depot.

Three distinct explosions aroused a half-hundred citizens, of Prairie Depot, who immediately armed themselves with revolvers, rifles and shotguns. Some of them emerged in scanty attire, so anxious were they to get on the scene of action which was no less than an attempt to blow the postoffice safe.

George Seltman, baker, who resides next door to the postoffice was the first to get into action. He fired several shots as the burglars started in a southerly direction on the run. He continued his firing until they had disappeared in the darkness. Then the shooting was taken up by William Tilton. None of the retreating yeggmens was injured, it is believed.

About a mile from the village the trio leaped into an automobile which had been secreted at the roadside. A chauffeur was thought to have been in waiting, as the engine of the machine was heard in the clear, frosty air within a few minutes after the attempted robbery. It is said the machine headed for Toledo, where the safe blowers are believed to have taken refuge.

Postmaster Theodore Frisbie, when seen by Sheriff Heald said the intruders could have obtained a large sum of money had they tarried but a few minutes longer, as the contents of the safe was easily accessible after the door had been blown off. The yeggmens were in such haste to get away they left their tools lying in front of the wrecked safe.

The Prairie Depot robbery makes the seventh job of safe blowing in northwestern Ohio in two weeks.

While it is unfortunately true that the village council have a hard time to "make both ends meet" in the matter of village finances, it is nevertheless true that it is not a wise policy to permit village property to deteriorate for want of proper and necessary repairs. This fact is particularly true with reference to the building used for council rooms and fire department. The roof of the building in in bad conditions and during rain storms the department room is flooded with water. Further failure to make necessary repairs will only result in additional expense later. "Do it now" should be the order.

And did you ever wake up on Christmas morning and go out to the kitchen and look at the stocking you had hung up the night before, and find that Santa Claus had failed to remember you?
