### SECURES \$5,000 VERDICT

Perrysburg Man Secures Verdict Against Gas Company.

Ernest Hoffman of Perrysburg, was given a verdict of \$5,000 in Common Pleas Court at Findlay last Thursday against the Logan Natural Gas Company for injuries sustained in a gas explosion in this city two years ago. Hoffman was standing in front of the Interurban station when the explosion occurred in the basement, flying glass and timber permanently disabling him it is alleged.

Judge Baldwin held that there was no corroboration of the prosecuting witness' testimony and that her testimony was vitiated largely by the affidavit made by her before Justice Comstock in which she denied the charges previously preferred by her against the defendant.

Examination for Position of Deputy District Assessor.

PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that Examination Number 4 of the State Civil Service Commission of Ohio for the position of Deputy District Assessor (Class H, Taxing Service) will be held at Bowling Green on January 3rd, 1914, at 9 A. M.

Applicants must be of legal age, citizens of the State of Ohio, be physically able to perform the duties of the position, write a legible hand and reside in the taxing district in which their duties are to be performed.

**Matching Shirts.**  
The laundryman's bookkeeper inquired innocently why she was required to charge the gentleman at No. 63 a higher price for washing his shirts and collars than any other customer.

"Because he belongs to the small but troublesome group of gentlemen who insist that their shirts, collars and white ties shall be exactly the same shade of white and send a brand new tie along as a sample to wash by," said the proprietor.

"It is very difficult to get several pieces of linen to turn out the same shade in the wash, partly because they are not all the same quality of linen. A garment that is part cotton is apt to wash yellow, a coarse linen absorbs more blue than a fine linen. I agree with No. 63 that nothing looks worse than a collar, tie and shirt of different degrees of whiteness. ## CIVIC ASSOCIATION

Organization Should be Continued and Good Work Pushed Forward.

The first year of the Perrysburg Civic Association's organization is nearly passed and in that first year there is much to contemplate and many causes for congratulation.

The "start" was made in a very humble manner and at a time when no previous thought of such a beginning was had.

It was at the firemen's first "coming out" supper when the Chief called upon the writer to act as toast master at the "after dinner" festivities, when, at an opportune moment, the toast master stated his belief that the time had come when a civic association could be perfected and called for a motion for the appointment of a committee of five to take up the work of planning such an organization.

Mayor Clay made the motion which was seconded by A. J. Witzler and the motion was adopted by unanimous vote. The toastmaster as chairman of the meeting appointed a committee of Mayor Clay, A. J. Witzler, Geo. J. Munger, J. J. Amon and E. L. Kingsbury. Those present then insisted that the chairman be added to the committee—thus making six members.

Later, the committee spent many long hours in preparing a constitution and by-laws and at last the organization was perfected. Officers elected, committees appointed and a campaign for members started.

The people know the result.

They also know what has been accomplished during the past year.

It would be something remarkable if some mistakes had not been made and, of course, there are others who might have done better than those who have been in charge of various departments of the work of the past year, but with all the mistakes, and notwithstanding the inability of the officers and committees to do everything just as everybody would have done, much good has been accomplished and the name Perrysburg appears upon the map in larger letters than ever before.

The election of nine Directors will occur at the meeting to be held on the evening of January 12, 1914, and this meeting should be attended by every member of the association who can possibly be present.

The association has had a remarkable growth and success and it is hoped the year of 1914 will show great gains in membership and work performed.

Every citizen should know that anything he will do for the town of Perrysburg will cast a creditable reflection upon himself.

## OBSERVATIONS

In his sermon, last Sunday Rev. Lowry said that Christ's birth in Bethlehem brought something to him only in whose heart Christ was also born, and he admonished all to let the sacredness of that holy birth enter every heart and drive out the spirit of jealousy, selfishness, envy, hatred and a desire to "get even."
