failed to cultivate,) so with a motor of 60 horse power, a man at the wheel who could grasp a steer by the horns and throw him down, it is easily understood that we did not slow up at many points over the route.

I urged my friend to drive faster; not because I wanted more speed, but because I wanted him to know that a Perrysburg man could ride just as fast as any New Mexico ranchman could drive, and I would not be bluffed; but the real reason was because I felt sure we would all be killed, and thought the sooner it was over the better. However, we arrived, and have made this and other more hazardous trips since, and have thus far been able to keep up my bluff, but if it should happen that I come home with my arms and legs tied to me with wires, it will be understood that I "bluffed" once too often.

This ranch is very interestingly located, and one of its historical features is the fact that directly through its center lies the old Santa Fe trail over which the intrepid 49ers passed on their weary march to California when desire to reap a part of that rich "find" in the gold fields of that State caused them to endure terrible hardships, dangers and privations on their overland journey. The marks of the trail are very plainly visible, and about eight rods from the Ranch house is the ruins of the old fort that was constructed here in 1848, and was occupied by a regiment of regulars for the purpose of holding possession of the then recently ceded territory as well as to give as much protection as possible from the Apache Indians who then filled this section, and as I look out of the window near me, I can see a mountain not more than two hundred feet from the house, and upon its summit is planted a wooden cross which marks the burial place of a Spanish priest who lost his life in the service of the Master while ministering to the Mexicans

in this locality when the Apaches surprised and massacred all who were not saved by timely interference of the troops. Following the massacre the bodies of the slain were buried and the cross planted to mark the place. This mountain is about a half mile in height and is the point to which we direct our course when leaving Santa Fe for the ranch. We are situated in a beautiful valley abounding with natural springs from which several small lakes are filled and the water used for irrigation purposes and in winter a splendid crop of chrysalis ice is obtained. During the fall and spring these lakes are frequented by myriads of wild duck.

The ranch is surrounded by mountains or foot hills so that the valley is almost constantly swept by mountain breezes which are always refreshing and the nights are restful because of the cool, clear air which makes heavy blankets a necessity, thus assuring a strengthening sleep which makes the following days work a pleasure, and although we are away from everybody, we do not feel lonesome because of the exceedingly interesting scene that is always with us and no matter in what direction we look there is something worth while to attract attention.

As yet I have not had time to dig among the ancient buildings and historic places of old Santa Fe but will do so next week and hope to find something that may be of interest to my friends at home.
