CROSSED THE DIVIDE.

As briefly mentioned in last week's Journal, W. F. Shipman, died at his home in Weston on the morning of Dec. 21, 1914, at the age of 52 years. Death was caused by apoplexy.

Surviving him are his wife and three brothers and two sisters: Eldridge, of Indianapolis; Lewis, of Perrysburg; Charles, of Weston; Mrs. W. P. Smith, of Weston, and Miss Stella Shipman of Toledo.

Mr. Shipman had been engaged in business in Weston for the past seven years conducting a meat market and by his courteous and pleasant manner and upright character, he was well and favorably known by a large circle of friends and acquaintances who deeply regret his departure.

He was a Past-Master of Weston lodge F. & A. M. and was also a Knight of Pythias.

On Saturday morning, Dec. 26, 1914, at 8 o'clock, Mrs. Corwin Wagoner passed away at her home in Stony Ridge after a long period of illness.

Funeral services were held at the church in LeMoyné on Tuesday morning, Rev. W. R. Ward officiating. The burial was made in the Luckey cemetery.

Mrs. Wagoner was 44 years of age and leaves her husband, three sisters and four brothers to mourn her departure.

She had formerly resided near LeMoyné but came to Stony Ridge two years ago immediately after her marriage with Mr. Corwin Wagoner, who is proprietor of the general store at Stony Ridge.

Henry Hoelter died Christmas eve at nine o'clock at his home in Luckey after an illness of ten days with meningitis.

He was born in Wittenberg, Germany, March 27th, 1816, and was aged at the time of his death 68 years, 8 months and 27 days. He came to America in 1870. Soon after going to Cleveland, he was married to Miss Anna Braucksek and they lived there six years when

they came to Wood county and took up their residence on a farm near Salem church east of Luckey. Two years later they purchased a farm one mile east of Luckey where they resided until three years ago when they came to town.

Ten children were born to them; one son who died in infancy, Henry who died sixteen years ago at the age of eighteen and the following children, who with the widow survive: W. H. of Luckey; Mrs. G. Sandwisch, of Woodville; Mrs. H. Stolte, of Cleveland; A. H., of near Luckey; Miss Carrie, a trained nurse, residing at home; S. J., of Cleveland; John, residing on the homestead; Mrs. George Meyer, of near Luckey, also one brother Fred and a sister, Mrs. Braucksek, who live in Germany; and a sister, Mrs. Fred Ussman, of Rossford; also twelve grandchildren.

The funeral was held in Zion Lutheran church, of which he was a faithful member, Monday afternoon at one o'clock, Rev. M. L. Frederic officiating. Burial will be made in Luckey cemetery.—Sentinel.
