## GAVE VALUABLE PROPERTY

For Purpose of Building Home for Aged People.

Adam Leydorf, of Perrysburg, has given a plot of 12 acres to the Evangelical Reformed Church of the United States on which a home for the aged is to be erected. The building will cost in the neighborhood of \$30,000 and will be entirely modern in all respects.

The plat of land is located just across the road from Mr. Leydorf's residence and is about two miles south of Perrysburg. Eight acres will be converted into a park and the remaining land will be utilized for the location of the buildings.

Dr. Kraatz, chairman of the committee to raise funds for the erection of the building, will immediately start a campaign for that purpose. Langdon and Hohly, architects, will prepare plans for the building.

## SECOND DEGREE MURDER

Trial of John H. Willey Now on in Common Pleas Court.

On Monday morning Judge McClelland began hearing the case of John H. Willey, charged with murder in the second degree for the killing of Mrs. Joel Kimble at her home near Bradner, on February, 12, 1915.

Willey is represented by attorneys E. D. Bloom and B. F. James, while the prosecuting attorney, Solether, assisted by Jonathan E. Ladd represent the State.

The murder was committed Feb 12. Neighbors heard Joel Kimble's cries for help and upon investigation found him in his barn and suffering from injuries inflicted by being beaten with a club. Mrs. Kimble, his wife, was found in the kitchen of the house with her head almost severed from her shoulders, presumably by a blow from a heavy club. Mrs. Kimble died a few hours later, but after hovering between life and death for several days, Mr. Kimble recovered and from information he gave suspicion pointed to John Willey and he was later arrested and bound over to court. Later the Grand Jury indicted him for second degree murder.

Willey lives near Gibsonburg, and with his wife, small daughter and father are seated in court anxiously awaiting the outcome of the trial.

The jury is composed of J. A. Conklin, farmer, Perrysburg; A. T. Carpenter, 39, farmer, Risingsun; Albert Zigler, 38, stone mason, Pemberville; Arthur Floyd, 56, oil pumper, Bays; Silas Musser, 54, Portage; James Finney, 45, farmer, Custar; O. C. Pienert, 62, farmer, Tontogany; L. D. Simon, 59, farmer, Bairdstown; Paul Bruning, 34, farmer, Pemberville; Joseph Garret, 69, retired, Haskins; Chauncey Underwood, 57, grocery owner Bowling Green; E. H. Kirrian, 42 farmer, North Baltimore.

Sheriff Skibbe conducted the jury to the scene of the murder on Tuesday.

Presidents of boards of education of the county assembled at the court house this morning to select a successor to T. H. Tinney of Lime City, as a member of the county board of education. Mr. Tinney and Tom Adams, of Montgomery township, both Republicans were the candidates, Mr. Adams was elected by a vote of fifteen to five. His term of office will be five years. ## SCHELLING GOES TO PEN

Another of the Toledo Crooks Receives His Reward.

Roy Schelling, alias Ray Huffman, of Toledo, was denied a new trial on Wednesday last by Judge McClelland and was sentenced to from one to 15 years in the penitentiary. He was convicted of burglarizing Wallace's garage at Perrysburg on Aug. 21.

### STUDY THE EVIDENCE.

"The American people must acquire the habit of looking into the evidence," said President Arthur T. Hadley of Yale in his matriculation sermon at Woolsey hall.

"We must stop buying the newspaper that tells what we wish was true and buy the one that tells what really is. We must refuse to repeat unproved gossip or scandal because we like it. This will soon grow into the habit of not liking it. We shall learn to hate the un-conscionous lie as well as the intentional one. There may sometimes be a question whether we should tell the truth to others who cannot see it or understand it; there should be no question at all that we should tell it to ourselves. And when a man has learned to tell the truth to himself the problem of telling it to others becomes comparatively easy. The whole fabric of American society rests on the assumption that we are going to be honest in our dealings."

### FUNERAL SERVICES.

The funeral service for Mr. William C. Perrin was held at the M. E. Church last Saturday afternoon, conducted by Phoenix lodge F. A. M., with Mr. Philip Wetzel as acting Master, assisted by Rev. Dr. Carter, pastor of the M. E. Church, as Chaplain.

As stated in our last issue, Mr. Perrin died at San Diego, California. He had been a resident of Perrysburg about 70 years, coming here when a child, from his birthplace, River St. John, Nova Scotia.
