## PASSING OF PIONEER EDITOR

Services for Henry S. Chapin, 80, veteran newspaper man and publisher, who died on Saturday afternoon after a two days' illness, were held in Bowling Green Monday afternoon under the auspices of Centennial lodge, I. O. O. F. The body was taken to Jefferson, Ohio, where burial took place on Tuesday.

Apoplexy was the cause of death.

Mr. Chapin, the founder of the Toledo Daily Bee, was born at Collinsville, Conn., on Jan. 4, 1835, but grew up in Ashtabula county. He began his newspaper career at 17, in the Weekly Telegraph office at Ashtabula, Ohio, subsequently "working at the case" on papers at Cincinnati and St. Louis.

In 1862 he and the late F. J. Oblinger, of Toledo, purchased the Perrysburg Journal. Later Mr. Chapin owned and published the Republican at Peru, Ind. In 1872 he founded the Sunday Journal at Toledo, which he sold to Gen. I. R. Sherwood and George S. Canfield.

On April 24, 1876, he began publication of The Bee and had charge of that paper for eight years.

After severing his connection with The Bee, Mr. Chapin was connected with the Toledo Post for two years, and later with the Toledo News.

In 1889 he became managing editor of the Columbus Post. On Sept. 1, 1880, Mr. Chapin purchased The Wood County Democrat, which he conducted successfully for 22 years. On Sept. 1, 1912, he sold The Wood County Democrat to D. C. VanVoorhis, his assistant editor, and F. W. Thomas, his foreman.—News-Bee.
