Valentine Theatre.

Thursday, Feb. 10th, will inaugurate at the Valentine Theatre the first performance in Toledo of Robert Louis Stevenson's ever-popular "Treasure Island."

The play is in four acts and nine scenes. Act I, The Admiral Benbow Inn; Act II, Scene 1, The Quay at Bristol; Act III, Scene 1, The Hispaniola at anchor some weeks later; off Treasure Island. Scene II, Treasure Island at dawn the following day. Scene 3, the Stockade; Scene 4, The Hispaniola adrift, night of same day. Act IV, Scene 1, The Pirates' Camp; Scene II, Spyglass Mountain; Scene 3, Gen. Gun's cave.

"Treasure Island" is a play for the young folks, and who is there who is not young in heart?

To hear Blind Pew come tap, tapping with his cane, that ominous tapping that presages the dread Black Spot; to chuckle with Long John Silver over his suave devilry aided by his parrot Capt. Flint and his persistent squawking "Pieces of eight, pieces of eight," to travel hand in hand with little Jim Hawkins, the boy whose "wish came true," to plot with Black Dog Israel Hands, George Merry and all the rest of the rollicking, treasure-seeking, murderous buccannery; to sail on the good ship Hispaniola with her mutinies, her saving by little Jim, and her mission fulfilled, when by old Ben Gunn, the half witted maroon, we are led into his cave and find the seven hundred thousand pounds in gold.

Mr. Hopkins has assembled a cast of twenty four well known players to portray the various familiar characters of "Treasure Island" and in addition to the fact that many of them bear international reputations for artistic work, they are most perfectly in tune. It is Mr. Hopkins aim always never to have an actor seem to "just step from the wings"—as he, himself, expresses it "but to be a living part of the picture."

Special incidental music has been written for the production by Maurice Rumsey, Musical Director of the Punch and Judy Theatre, New York. At the head of the cast is George Fawcett, who will play Long John Silver; and Ruth Vivian, as Jim Hawkins; both of whom are well known to Toledo theatre goers.

On and after next Monday, Feb. 7, the new fee schedule of physicians will go into effect, and are as follows:
City calls, \$1.50
Night calls, between 9 P. M. and 7 A. M., \$2.00
Office Prescriptions, 75c and up.
Calls outside city limits \$2.00
Rural calls \$2.00 for the first mile and 75c for each additional mile.
Obstetric cases \$15.00 up.
