GREATEST WORLD'S FAIR COMING.



CANADA'S NEW WAR LOAN.


Canadians seem keen for their new loan, but \$180,000,000 was subscribed.

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FAMINE OF PLATINUM.

One of the results of the war is that it has become almost impossible to get platinum. There is no substitute for this rare metal for certain uses. The price has gone up to \$91 per ounce, or about four times its usual price. The quality chiefly valuable in platinum is that it expands and contracts with heat or cold exactly as glass does. That makes it greatly desired for electric light bulbs, at the spot where the wire passes through the glass.

GREAT DISCOVERY OF POTASH.

Ten thousand acres of valuable potash deposits have been discovered in Cuba. The potash is in the form of oxide, while that which comes from Germany is a chloride. The deposit lies close to the surface. Holes have been drilled to a depth of 600 feet without showing how deep it goes.

In the United States there is a "famine" of potash at present, because the war has cut off the German supplies.


