## LAST CHANCE

July 5th Final Date for Enlistment for Overseas Service.

The opportunity to see the battlefields of France at Uncle Sam's expense will soon be a thing of the past. The War Department has informed the Recruiting Office at 416 Adams street, Toledo, that no men can be accepted for service in France after July 5th, 1919. All men who desire to go to France can be accepted up to the 5th day of July and they will be sent at once to Camp Meade for transportation to France.

The recruiting office announces that men can now be accepted for service on the border in practically all branches including Cavalry and Air Service. These two popular branches are being rapidly filled to capacity and the announcement that they will be closed is likely to be received at any time. The Motor Transport Corps has been authorized to accept men for service in Hawaii and the Philippines. The acceptance of men for the Motor Transport Corps Panama has been closed.

## DEATH OF MRS. FRUSHER

Mary A. Cordrey Frusher was born in Seneca county, Ohio, November 11, 1840, and departed this life on June 24, 1919, at the age of 79 years, 2 months and 29 days.

She was united in marriage to Thos. Frusher, of Perrysburg, on August 30, 1863. To this union six children were born, three sons, Edward, William and Charles, and three daughters, Mrs. Albert Kazmaier, Mrs. W. I. Taylor, of Perrysburg, and Mrs. Fred Hemminger, of Essex, Ontario, Canada.

Deceased has lived in this community her entire married life and died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. W. I. Taylor, with whom she had made her home for the past three years. Her husband preceded her to the grave on April 2, 1915.

Her sickness was of short duration, being confined to her bed but a week, she passed away Tuesday morning at 4 o'clock, leaving the comforting evidence that all was well and that she was going to the home of the redeemed.

Besides a host of friends and relatives she leaves to mourn, three sons, three daughters, three sisters, one brother, 33 grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were Thursday at 2 p. m. at the church in Perrysburg, conducted by Rev. C. W. Weltmer, assisted by Rev. E. J. Webster, of Toledo. Interment was made at Ft. Meigs cemetery.

## AGRICULTURE NOTES

Many Prizes for Club Members at State Fair.

Over \$1,000 in prizes and trips are being offered to members of boys' and girls' agricultural and home economics clubs at the Ohio State Fair. To attract canning demonstration teams, the state fair management will pay the railroad fare of three club members in each county, provided that someone within the county will provide expenses in Columbus.

The total amount of prizes for pigs is \$575. A large portion of the money is contributed by the different breed associations.

Following is a list of the prizes:

Duroc-Jerseys—Fund of \$150 divided in 10 prizes.

Chester Whites—Fund of \$125 divided in 10 prizes.

Poland Chinas—Fund of \$100 divided in nine prizes, and a bronze trophy.

Hampshire—Fund of \$100 divided in 10 prizes.

Berkshires—Fund of \$50 divided in eight prizes.

Grades and crossbreeds—Same as Berkshires.

Ten prizes amounting to \$125 will be offered to food clubs, 10 prizes amounting to \$80 will be given to clothing clubs, and banners will be awarded to the best canning demonstration teams.

All entries will close August 11, and exhibits must be in place on the fair grounds not later than Monday morning, August 25. No entry fees will be charged. Exhibits will be sent to W. H. Palmer, State Fair Grounds, Columbus.

Cost \$256 to Keep a Cow.

The cost of keeping a cow last year was \$256, according to official advanced registry records of 772 cows on a number of representative dairies in Ohio, according to Professor Oscar Erf of the Ohio State University. The cost of producing milk per hundred was \$4.05.

The cost of feed was \$126, labor \$61, and overhead expense \$60.

Following are the items that entered into the cost of feed: Concentrates, \$49.58; hay, \$35.72; stover, \$1.67; silage, \$22.51; pasture (figured at 10 cents a day) \$17.05.

The average amount of labor required per cow was 195 hours, and of superintendence 12 hours. Figured at 29.5 cents an hour, the average price paid for labor, the total was \$61.07.

The items entering into the cost of overhead expense per cow were \$32.57 for supplies; \$27.85 for cost of depreciation and upkeep; .85 for insurance, and \$5.06 for taxes.

### Youngsters Raising High Priced Heifers.

Forty-four Putnam county boys and girls have organized a short-horn calf club with headquarters at Columbus Grove. Each member has secured a purebred Scotch shorthorn heifer, the average value of each animal being \$550. The organization was formed with the co-operation of the Putnam County Fair Bureau and the Columbus Grove Shorthorn Breeders' Association.

## ATTENTION SOLDIERS!

Soldiers, Sailors and Marines to Meet at Civic Rooms July 7.

There has been incorporated under the laws of Ohio an organization to be composed of those who wore the uniform of the United States army, navy and marine corps and were in the military or naval service of the United States during the period between April 6, 1917 and November 11, 1918, both dates inclusive, and all persons who served in the military or naval service of any of the governments associated with the United States during the World War, provided that they were, and are again, citizens of the United States, except those persons separated from the service under terms amounting to dishonorable discharge, and except also those persons who refused to perform their military duties on the ground of conscientious or political objection.

This organization is incorporated under the name of the American Legion, a name decided upon at a caucus of enlisted men and officers at a meeting of the American Expeditionary Forces in Paris last spring, and at a convention of those in the United States, held at St. Louis, Mo., May 8, 9 and 10, 1919.

A meeting is called for next Monday evening, July 7th, at 8 p. m. at the Civic Association rooms to organize a local branch of the American Legion and all men who served either at home or abroad are urged to be present.

Lt. Col. Geo. P. Greenhalgh will be present and will be prepared to explain the objects of the organization.

### DELAY IN RABIES CASE MAY RESULT IN DEATH

Delay in diagnosis and treatment is responsible for most deaths following bites by dogs or other animals infected with rabies, said the State Department of Health today. If treatment is postponed it may be too late to effect a cure according to the department.

"Whenever there is the slightest suspicion that the animal has rabies, the person bitten should receive the Pasteur treatment at once, without waiting for confirmation of the suspicion," said the department's warning. "Treatment can be discontinued if the laboratory examination proves it unnecessary. The head of an animal sent to the department laboratory for diagnosis should be sent by messenger to insure against delay."

## TOWN BUYS FIRE-ENGINE

Perrysburg Now Has Fine Up-to-Date Chemical Wagon.

Through the efforts of a special committee consisting of Messrs. Wm. Mills, Harry Thornton, Geo. J. Munger, Wm. Dibling, John Hayes, Robert Hillbrand and A. G. Williams, appointed by the Civic Association, a fund was raised by popular subscription to purchase a chemical fire engine for Perrysburg.

Much credit is due the loyal citizens of our village for the manner in which they responded, especially to the River road residents. Messrs. R. C. Pew and W. S. Walbridge were responsible for a \$2,000 contribution from their neighbors and themselves.

The new fire apparatus is a Reo truck with an Ajax chemical equipment and was purchased from the Furgeson Industrial Co. of Toledo at a cost of \$2,775.00. The truck is to be delivered here within 60 days. \$50.00 of the cost price still remains to be contributed. If you haven't given toward this new and much needed project and care to do so leave your contribution with any member of the committee afore mentioned.
