What Roosevelt Memorial Is

THE ROOSEVELT MEMORIAL ASSOCIATION has been formed to act as an agency in erecting stone and living memorials to Theodore Roosevelt, which shall keep alive in America for all time the stimulus to right living, high ideals and noble patriotism which flowed from his deeds and teachings.

We are seeking to raise a minimum of \$5,000,000—of which we are looking hopefully to Ohio for \$500,000.

Obviously, the character of the actual memorials to be erected, and their location, are questions that must not be decided without serious consideration as to their appropriateness and the desires of the country at large. So we have deferred definite decision until we all have had time to be very certain as to exactly what will best serve to honor the memory of The Great American.

A monument in Washington, a park at Oyster Bay, to be preserved like Mount Vernon, and a Roosevelt Foundation, are being considered.

The preliminary work of the association has found that everywhere the sentiment of the country favors these two forms of expression of the memorial:

First, a memorial that shall be immediate and will enable the people to record at once and forcibly their determination to uphold and maintain his staunch Americanism.

Second, permanent memorials that will, as nearly as possible, perpetuate and correctly interpret his character and Americanism to future generations.

To accomplish the first, the various state and local committees are requested to arrange for meetings on Roosevelt's birthday, October 27. These meetings will be the immediate memorial.

To carry out the second—the permanent memorial—the week of October 20-27 will be devoted to the receipt of contributions for the building of these memorials.

New Cases Filled

Edwin F. Dumond has brought suit for divorce from Erma May Dumond to whom he was married in 1912 at Bellefontaine. He asks for custody of their two children. Statutory grounds are alleged.

C. Reed Campbell asks judgment against Harry P. and Rosa A. Gutrie for \$437.79 on a promissory note and for sale of live stock on which he holds a chattel mortgage to satisfy the judgment.

Roscoe C. Griffith in a suit against Andrew M. Abbott asks judgment for \$1,682.86 on a promissory note.

Philomena Ratty in a suit against Loyal B. Curtis et al. seeks to force conveyance of a deed to six acres in lot forty, Douglas Farm Addition, Lake township, reciting that Wm. Ratty from whom she received her right to the property fulfilled the conditions of its purchase but that transfer has not been made. The amount involved is \$1,050.

The Gram Bernstein Motor Truck Co seeks to recover a motor truck from George C. Leffer, having filed a petition in replevin in the common pleas court.

Paul C. Keyes, receiver of the First National Bank of Bowling Green, has petitioned the common pleas court for permission to sell lot 62, a livery stable building now used as a garage, in Haskins, to M. C. Paquette, of Stony Ridge, for \$890, payable \$400 in cash, \$250 payable in June, 1920, \$250 in November, 1920, the deferred payments to draw interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum.

James Avery has brought suit against Benjamin M. Soleau, et al., for \$1750. He claims this amount is due him as commission for finding a purchaser for property of Soleau, 120 acres of land in section 12, Plain township. He states that he was to receive one-half of all sums in excess of \$18 per acre and that he found the defendant W. C. Burkhardt, as such purchaser at \$210 per acre.

Marie McCollough has brought suit for divorce from Milford McCollough, to whom she was married in Sept. 16th 1916, at Adrian, Mich. They have no children. She says that at the suggestion and earnest solicitation of the defendant she acquiesced in keeping the marriage a secret and that it was so kept for a long time thereafter. She charges that he failed to provide for her. She asks restoration to her maiden name of Marie Dubelzig.

Charles L. Derby asks for divorce from May A. Derby to whom he was married in December, 1913. He charges her with neglect of duty in the way of unnecessary absences from home and that last December she left him while he was ill with influenza and sick in bed and has been willfully absent for nearly a year now.

Suit to quiet title to lot 249 in Tarr's addition to North Baltimore has been brought by Ananias W. Turner, et al., against John Lyons, et al.

Appeal from the court of L. D. Arnold of Henry township has been taken by Campbell & Mong. The latter were given judgment for \$35 and costs against James Wood. They had asked for \$50.59 for labor and material furnished Wood.

Hazel Ewing asks for divorce from Roscoe E. Ewing to whom she was married in 1915. They have no children and she asks restoration to her former name of Lake. She charges willful absence for more than three years.
