REAL NATIVE PRIMA DONNA

Miss Kathryn Lee, of Mayflower Stock Organizing American Opera Singers.

PHILADELPHIA Pa.—When the three hundredth anniversary of the landing of the Pilgrim Fathers at Plymouth Rock is celebrated next year that signal event will have unusual significance for Miss Kathryn Lee, the famous prima donna soprano, this season at Willow Grove. Miss Lee is descended from two of those personages that came to the new world in the Mayflower. These were Miles Standish and Priscilla Mullen. All Americans are familiar with the noted poem, "The Courtship of Miles Standish," which is one of the best by the great poet, Longfellow. And everybody also knows that Priscilla did not marry Miles, but gave her hand to John Alden, who so urgently pleaded his friend's cause that Priscilla made the memorable statement: "Speak for yourself, John."

But not all Americans know that the daughter of John Alden and Priscilla Mullen married a son of Miles Standish, and that there are several noted Americans who are descended from that union. The best known of these is Miss Lee, who claims to be the most American of all prima donnas that were born in the United States.

There are few artists who can trace their ancestry back in an unbroken line to such distinguished forebears as can Miss Lee. And it is for this reason, that the cantatrice is insistent that opera singers, who have been born in America should be based together in an American Society representative their nativity. Miss Lee is now busily engaged in organizing such a society and among its members will be such noted people as Lillian Russell, Emma Eames, Caroline White, Orville Harrold, Geraldine Farrar, Reinald Werrenrath, Thomas Chalmers and other singers.

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SO DEMOCRATIC!

Prince Of Wales Receives A Legal Training Lasting Three Minutes.

LONDON.—One of the most rapid and thoroughly condensed educational careers on record ran its course at the Middle Temple here when the Prince of Wales was called to the bar after a legal training lasting approximately three minutes. On the motion of Lord Coleridge, seconded by Lord Finlay, the Prince was admitted a student of the society and signed the admission form. Thereupon Lord Mersey moved and Master Balfour Browne seconded, "that his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales be called to the degree of the Utter Bar," and the Prince signed the call book of the Inn, thus becoming a barrister. Without loss of time Mr. Digby moved and Lord Moulton seconded, "that his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales be invited up to the bench," and this was agreed to. Thus, remarks the chronicler of the interesting scene, his Royal Highness within ten minutes went through a career which often occupies an ordinary individual twice as many years. MAGNETIZED TOOL HELPS

Screwdriver Is Big Aid To The Auto Repair Man

"I magnetized a screwdriver by holding it close to a dynamo for a few minutes, nearly two years ago, and it is still my most valued helper when I do repair work on my car," says a writer in the Electrical Experimenter.

"It is a great help when working around the car to have this magnetized screwdriver pick up screws and small pieces of machinery which drop down inside, out of reach. It does away entirely with the annoyance of the screw slipping away and getting lost, as it so often does. I always carry it in the tool box, and find the other fellow appreciates it when I find him having car troubles on some lonely bit of road."

SOME PURE FOOD OPINIONS

The Government's Views on Real Fruit Jelly, Good Marmalade and Artificial Mineral Waters

Real fruit jelly must "jell" because of the fruit juice in it and not because gelatin has been added to it, according to a recent government opinion under the Food and Drugs Act. This ruling states that a product thickened by gelatin can not properly be labeled as fruit jelly, but must indicate by its name its true character. The official definition of jelly on which this opinion is based is: "Jelly is the sound, semi-solid, gelatinous product made by boiling clean, sound, properly matured and prepared fresh fruit with water, concentrating the expressed and strained juice, to which sugar (sucrose) is added, and conforms in name to the fruit in its preparation."

Marmalade is harder to define, and government experts are now investigating the subject with a view to determining proper standards for products of this character. The proportions originally laid down were 45 pounds of fruit to 55 pounds of sugar. It was found impracticable, however, to make a satisfactory product that would conform absolutely to this requirement, and the question is being studied further. In the meantime no action will be taken by the government against marmalade that is made from clean, properly matured and prepared fresh fruit and sugar, even if the proportions vary somewhat from the standard already stated.

A Good Growing Pig Ration For young pigs just being weaned, and just learning to eat grain, the following is an excellent ration: Corn meal, three parts; oats from which the hulls have been sifted out, three parts; shorts, three parts, and oil meal, one part. We would feed this in the form of a slop, using skim milk to help make the slop where it is available.

The young pigs may be given this feed in the same troughs with their mothers or they may be fed separately. This ration is not one of the cheapest, but it is one of the best. Bran is too bulky to feed except in small amount to young pigs. Tankage can be used in place of oilmeal or can be alternated with the oilmeal. In connection with the slop mentioned above we would feed small amounts of shelled corn. The young pigs seem to relish part of their corn in this form, and it prevents scours.

This may be improved considerably in palatability if a greater variety of feed is given. Under varying market conditions oilmeal, oats, barley, red dog flour, shorts and skim milk may all be used to advantage with pigs of this size. Corn, of course, forms the bulk of the economical ration. On pasture it is not necessary to use so much of the other feeds in connection with corn, as it is in a dry lot.

After weaning the pigs will of course be on pasture. For a short time we would continue the slop above mentioned, or any similar one which contains about one part of protein to ev-

ery five or six parts of carbohydrates and fat, but would gradually change it until the corn is given mostly in the ear form, and tankage is substituted for the oilmeal, shorts and ground oats.

A most efficient ration for growing pigs on pasture would be one composed of about six parts of corn to one of tankage. It is possible that large gains might be secured by feeding a greater variety of feeds. But at present prices corn and tankage would almost certainly produce the cheapest gains.
