A WELCOME HOME.

Reception and Banquet Tendered by Leading Citizens to Ex-Speaker Keifer, at the Arcade Thursday Next.

A movement inaugurated a day or two since and quietly canvassed among leading business and professional men of the city culminated last evening in the drawing up of a paper, which received the signatures of a large number of representatives of the classes mentioned, extending to our distinguished townsman, Hon. J. W. Keifer, the hospitalities of his fellow citizens, irrespective of party, through a reception and banquet, in token of appreciation of his services and successful efforts in behalf of this city.

The paper was placed in General Keifer's hands today, and the cordial and courteous invitation by him accepted, naming Thursday evening of next week, March 19, as the time, therefore, at the Arcade Hotel. The only invitations issued will be to parties outside the city, including Hon. John Little, General Keifer's successor in Congress, and the editors of leading Republican journals in the Eighth Congressional district.

The company will be limited to one hundred, that being the number that can be accommodated comfortably at the Arcade, and as already stated will include gentlemen of all party affiliations. NOTICE is hereby given that the city of Springfield, Ohio, will offer for sale to the highest and best bidder at the Council Chamber in said city, on Tuesday, the 31st day of March, A. D. 1885, at 3 o'clock p. m., the bonds of said city to the amount of nine thousand (\$9,000) dollars; said bonds to be a denomination of \$1,000 each, to bear 6 per cent. interest from the date of sale until the payment of the principal thereof; principal and interest on said bonds to be payable at the City Treasurer's office in this city, on the 1st day of September, A. D. 1885. Said bonds to be issued for the purpose of obtaining a loan in anticipation of the General Revenue Fund of the city for the present year, in pursuance of section 2760 of the Revised Statutes of Ohio. Said bonds, when sold, to be taken and paid for in cash by the purchaser thereof within five days from date of sale of same. Bids for the purchase of said bonds may be filed in writing with the City Clerk at any time prior to the time above named for the sale of said bonds, and bids, either verbal or in writing, will be received on the 31st day of March, at 8 o'clock p. m., when all bids will be considered by the City Council, and said bonds will be sold at not less than par value, subject to the conditions hereinafore set forth, to the highest and best bidder. HOUSE MOVING.

For the improvement of sidewalk, curb and gutter, Resolved, That it is hereby declared by the City Council of the City of Springfield, Ohio, that the sidewalks on both sides of Clifton street, between Taylor street and East street, where the same have not been already done, shall be improved by curbing and paving the gutters, and paving the sidewalks with brick; and the sidewalks on both sides of Columbus street, between Western avenue and East street, and the sidewalks on both sides of said streets, shall be improved by curbing and paving the gutters, and that it is necessary that each of the above improvements be made (except so much thereof as exists in the property of W. H. C. Goodie, on Columbus street), and the same shall be constructed according to the ordinances of this city regarding such improvements, and the owners of the property, bounding and abutting upon said streets, shall be ordered to construct and pave the sidewalks and gutters within 30 days from legal service upon them of notice of the passage of this resolution.

That said property owners are hereby further notified that, as the expiration of said period of 60 days said Council will cause said improvements to be made, or so much thereof as shall not have been already done by the property owners, and will by ordinance order the assessment of the expenses thereon upon the property bounding and abutting upon said sidewalks and gutters to be improved, in proportion to the respective feet front of said properties; and that said Council will by said ordinance further provide for certifying said assessments to the contractor doing the same, for said city in payment thereof according to the laws and ordinances of this city, and that the City Engineer is hereby directed, upon the completion of the work, to forthwith prepare and report to Council a statement of the cost of said improvement, and that the City Clerk is hereby directed to certify to the Mayor a copy hereof and also cause legal publication to be made of the passage of this resolution.
