

CITY MATTERS.

No arrests last night. W. S. Hoffman is in Columbus today on business. Mrs. McLaughlin put up \$50 bail for her appearance Friday for trial for keeping her saloon open on Sunday.

Miss Emma Dyer and Mrs. W. S. Stuckenbergh, who have been visiting in Springfield, left today for Cincinnati.

Among the fourth class postmasters commissioned yesterday was Thomas J. Meranda, New Carlisle, Clark county, Ohio.

Joseph Hawkins, a prominent and highly respected young citizen of Harmony township, is reported lying very ill at his home.

The Pleasant township assessor made his final report today to the county auditor. Total personalty, \$252,970, against \$208,200 last year, a falling off of \$44,770.

The country to the north and west of us enjoyed a good shower last evening, but only one one-hundredth of an inch of rain fell in the city. Rain is much needed as many cisterns are running dry and gardens suffer.

Assessor M. M. Miller, of Moorefield township, made his returns to the county auditor this morning. Total personalty in the township \$356,025, a shortage of \$68,000 from last year. This is due in part to the fact that one man who returned \$26,000 as administrator of an estate last year now returns none of that, the amount having been divided among heirs out of the township.

The committee on furniture and decoration for the State Convention wigwag will have an important meeting at 7:30 this evening, in the law office of Chase Stewart, Esq., Arcade building. Some members of this committee have attended none of the meetings as yet, and it is requested that all be present this evening. The entertainment committee have heard from a majority of the county delegations approving assignments made. Death of the Dialton Postmaster. William Michael, Esq., merchant and postmaster at Dialton since an office was established there, and long a prominent and highly respected citizen of this county, died last night at his home. Deceased was fifty-five years of age and was born in German township, where his life had been passed, except a few years of residence in Indiana, about thirty years ago. He leaves a wife and one daughter, Emma, wife of Mr. George Collins. Deceased was a local preacher in the Methodist church and no man stood higher in the community for those qualities that give a man standing than he. He had amassed a competency, but was liberal and ever ready to aid the needy. The funeral will occur Thursday at 10 o'clock a. m. Services at Newson chapel. It is likely an immense congregation will gather at that time.
