While the great leaders in the war of the Rebellion are writing its history and disputing over the honors, the need of praise to be awarded the commanders in the great battles which they fought, there comes now and then, up out of the mysterious silence of the unwritten history of that conflict, incidents of such noble, unselfish sacrifice, tenderly touching and so far removed from the ordinary selfish actions of poor human nature that glaring faults in the one are, and happily they may be, overlooked or generously condoned. One of these is told by the Washington Critic:

There is a United States flag at the War Department, the history of which the authorities know nothing except that it was found in the Confederate War Department and is marked with the name of the "Fifty-third Illinois Volunteer Infantry." The flag shows evident signs of hard fighting in its neighborhood, for it is covered in many places with bullet holes, and through the starchy field and in ten places in the silk stripes are gaping holes where pieces of shell have torn their way. They are deep as a flag-staff and the holes are three or four inches across and are so close together that they almost seem to have torn their way from the shell to the flag. The War Department do not know where it was captured.

The great wigwag made a first-class meeting place, and the delegates and visitors will long remember the public spirit of Springfield's citizens, the warm welcome received at their hands, and their untiring efforts to make the sojourn of the pilgrims pleasant and agreeable. The press was especially well cared for. The gymnasium, a very large, airy room in Bookwalter's Opera house, was set apart for their use. There was ample desk-room, good light; paper, pencils, and other necessities were furnished free, and every effort made to have them feel at home. The credit of this is due to the press committee, under the energetic and untiring direction of Mr. Perkins, its chairman. Messrs. C. M. Nichols and Folger, of the Globe-Republic, were unsparring in their efforts to render all the courtesies possible, and they made hours of friends by so doing. The telegraphic facilities were ample, and there was very little delay in the transmission of news. Altogether, Springfield and her citizens deserve the heartfelt thanks of every one in attendance at the convention.

Few things are more fascinating in their way than a study of the subterranean history of man, whether in caves or in mounds, whether it be to corroborate written history, or to take testimony that antedates all writing. President Bartlett, of Dartmouth, contributes an interesting article on this topic to the July number of the North American Review. From the men of unknown ages and their works underground, to the men grappling with the latest questions of our own day and discussing the parceling out of the earth's surface, is a long step; but in the same number of the Review appears a conversation between David Dudley Field and Henry George, on land and taxation. Another urgent question, which may soon make a very serious issue, the extradition of dynamic criminals, is debated by President Angell, of Michigan University, George Ticknor Curtis, and Justice T. M. Cooley. Dorman B. Eaton, Chief of the Civil Service Commission, gives his views of the results of that reform. William Clarke shows the futile character of any scheme for British imperial federation, and Thomas W. Knox gives a brief but interesting sketch of the progress of European influence in Asia. The other articles are one by Gail Hamilton on Prohibition in Practice, and one by Rev. Dr. C. H. Parkhurst on the decline of Christianity. These, with the batch of free-hand Comments, make up a number of unusual interest. If the allotted age of man were sufficient for a magazine, we might have to part here with an old friend; for the Review has just completed its seventeenth year. But outwardly it renews its youth with a new cover, and inwardly it seems more vigorous than ever.

THE SENATORIAL CAUCUS. Republicans should remember that the ward and township caucuses, at which the delegates to the Republican Senatorial Convention are to be chosen, will be held, in most cases, at the usual voting places, on Monday evening next. The Convention is to be held at Black's Opera House, Thursday next, June 25th, at 11 a. m. It is important that all members of the party should be present promptly at the hour of opening—8 o'clock in the city and 7 in the country—and do what they can to procure the appointment of the best men as delegates.

MR. UHL AND HIS PICTURES. Our readers have already been advised, through these columns, of the good work which our fellow-townsmen, Mr. S. Jerome Uhl, has done, as an artist, in Europe. He is already, after only a four years' sojourn on the continent, beginning to take high rank among painters. The mere fact that he had two pictures accepted, out of over four thousand by other artists which were rejected for exhibition at the Paris Salon, this year, at the same time that many really meritorious artists of good standing had only one of their pictures admitted, shows the measure of his success. We are pleased to state, in connection with this, that a number of Mr. Uhl's pictures, painted on orders, have recently arrived here, and are at the residence of Mr. J. W. Phillips, on East High street. Two of them are for Mr. John W. Bookwalter, and they are not only pictures of great merit, but have general features which commend them to popular appreciation. One of these, representing a marine view at Dieppe, with an expanse of the channel and a stretch of sea beach in the foreground and the Chalk cliffs in the background, is a very attractive and meritorious picture. Two fine pictures are also here for Mr. B. H. Warden. One of them is certainly remarkable. It is entitled "The Triumph of Christ." Christ and the two thieves are seen hanging on their crosses, at night, while above them is a cloud of the heavenly host, hovering near, apparently to minister to the Divine sufferer.

There are several "Views in Normandy," several portraits—one of Mrs. S. J. Uhl, the wife of the artist, painted for her mother in this city—and one of Miss Alice Hamline, which is to be presented to that young lady. Three of the pictures are for sale, and they are certainly works of great artistic and general merit. We should be glad if all the pictures could be framed and placed on exhibition, for a short time, in a place where a good light could be thrown upon them and where all who wish to do so might see them.
