CYCLONE DESOLATION. TRREE HUNDRED HOMELESS AND

DESTITUTE PROPER. Remarkable Escapes From Death-Sight-Seers Arriving by Thousands-Aid and Much More Needed.

WASHINGTON, C. H., Sept 12 .- The curious people from far and near still come by thousands to view the rains of the stricken city. But six persons have died from injuries, which is regarded as very remarkable, considering the great dangers, and remarkable hairbreath peculiar freaks of the storm are being discovered on all sides. It is related that Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Craig had gone up town just before the storm commenced, leaving their two little boys, aged respectively one and a half and three and a half years, in charge of Mrs. Craig's sister, Miss Lucy Pine. The babies had just been put to bed when the storm came up, and Miss Pine, with rare presence of mind, flew to the side of the bed, and own home in Cincinnati, just as the roof was torn away, she leaned over the prostrate infants and received the weight of a large joist across her back, prob-ably saving the little ones from instant death, and on motion by James Foley, R. F. He As it was, the elder boy was pinned fast to the bad by fallen lumber, resting on the side

of his head. Miss Pine, by forcing the bed springs downward, managed to drag out the frightened child, and, with both in her arms, crawled from an incredibly small place and started for a place of safety, and was met at the front rescued babies. Mr. Craig's beautiful little home has been built but a short time, and is a pitiable sight.
