TOWNSHIP TRUSTEES. The Old Goes Out and the New Comes In.

The old trustees of Springfield township met at their usual place of meeting at 9:30 o'clock this morning, for the purpose of closing up the business of the board. A number of bills were passed, including one of \$42,000 for W. H. Berger for services as trustee. The board then adjourned sine die on motion of W. H. Davidson, who immediately vacated his seat in favor of Thomas O'Brien, the newly elected member, who had previously been sworn into office.

On motion of Mr. Williamson, Mr. W. H. Berger was elected president for the coming year. The following bonds were approved: John C. Parsons, constable, in the sum of \$1,000, with O. F. Services and Elizabeth C. Cunningham as sureties; Ed Coates, same, with R. F. Hayward and E. T. Thomas; Thomas Odett, clerk, in the sum of \$1,000, with Walter Collins and S. Taylor; John W. Parsons, treasurer, in the sum of \$10,000, with W. C. Downey, J. S. Kitchen and David West. Also bonds of supervisors in the sum of \$100 each. But little other business was transacted.
