POISONED A FAMILY

A Package of Flour Brings Death to a Neighbor.

HUNTING FOR THE MISCREANT.

If He is Caught an Attempt Will be Made to Lynch Him.

Another Family Receives Poisoned Fruit by Mail—It Nearly Killed Six Persons Who ate It—No Clue as to Who Sent the Package—The Victims Saved by the Timely Arrival of a Physician.

HAGERSTOWN, Md., June 19.—News has just been received here of a mysterious case of poisoning in the village of Locust Grove.

Daniel Shifler, a farmer, found in the lane near his house a package of flour and another of coffee. He sought for an owner, and not finding one gave the articles to a Mrs. McKerran. She used the flour and her entire family were made very sick. One boy died and another is expected to die. The other members of the family—the husband, John McKerran, the wife and two children are in a critical condition.

A post-mortem showed that poison had been mixed with the flour.

Two years ago an attempt was made to poison Mr. Shifler's stock, and a year ago his barns were broken down. The authorities, convinced that the poisoned flour and coffee were intended for Mr. Shifler's family, are searching for the miscreant among those who are known to be at enmity with him.

A posse of citizens are investigating, and threaten to lynch the prisoner if caught.

POISON CAME BY MAIL.

Six Persons Nearly Killed by Eating Crystallized Fruit.

RICHMOND, Va., June 19.—Mrs. E. D. Reid, who resides in the central part of this city, received by mail about 9 a. m. a small package of crystallized fruit. An hour or two later she ate a portion of it and gave the rest to a Miss Woolley, who lives in the house, and to a negro woman and three negro children.

In a short time all six were taken desperately ill with cramps, and a physician said they had been poisoned. Three hours' hard work afforded some relief, but they are by no means out of danger.

No one in the house has any clue or any suspicion as to who sent the package. Had the physician reached them an hour later they would have been past all possibility of recovery. As it is they may get well.

SIXTY WERE KILLED.

Further Details of the Cloudburst on Conception Mountain.

CITY OF MEXICO, June 19.—Latest advices about the cloudburst on Conception Mountain, near the mining town of Los Catorce, El Potrero and La Cruzes, in the State of San Luis Potosi, Mexico, are to the effect that at least 60 lives were lost. Fifteen bodies have already been recovered.

After the cloudburst an immense stream poured down the mountain side, sweeping away the houses of the miners. The tunnel of Guadalupe Mine filled with water. Some miners, who were at work within it, were drowned.

Many persons living in the cliff dwellings were hurled alive. Hundreds of pack animals were drowned.

The losses of the mining companies are heavy. A great quantity of high grade metal was carried away.

Dunn Calls Slavin a Brute.

New York, June 19.—Last night in the St. James Hotel Slavin and Mitchell, who seemed to have been drinking, made a good deal of noise, and intimidated in a roundabout way to Jere Dunn that he had been afraid to decide that Slavin was knocked out, because his (Dunn's) friends had bet against that result. Dunn replied that if he only got a bad reputation from such people as the men who were talking, his character would always be of the best. Then he told Slavin that he ought to be ashamed of himself for speaking in that style, and finally called him a brute. Slavin was requested to leave the hotel, and he did.

Must Go to Prison.

New York, June 19.—Judge Beach of the Supreme Court has signed the order in remittitur from the Court of Appeals in the case of Johann Most, thus making the judgment of that court the judgment of the Supreme Court. The District Attorney has been waiting for this action to commit Most. Mrs. Ida Hoffman, who has been on Most's bail ever since the appeal was taken has been notified to produce the famous Anarchist in Court for sentence.

The Jury in the Heap Will Case Disagree.

WILLMANTIC, Conn., June 19.—The jury in the Heap will case reported a disagreement, standing nine against sustaining the instrument and three for it. The trial occupied two weeks and has attracted considerable interest. The will involved property valued at \$30,000 left to T. M. Cushman, of this city, by the late Mrs. E. R. Heap.

The Gloriana a Wonder.

New York, June 19.—The regatta of the New York Yacht Club was sailing in a gale. A heavy sea was also running, but the Gloriana, Mr. Morgan's new boat, proved herself a wonder and showed that she can sail in any weather. She easily won her hull class, beating her nearest competitor, the Jessica, 11 minutes, 21 seconds.

Sold Out O'Brien and Dillon's Bondsman.

DUBLIN, June 19.—At Tipperary the police levied upon and sold at auction the goods of the persons who went on the sureties of Messrs. Dillon and O'Brien, forfeited by Messrs. America. One of the parties bought his goods for \$1,000, the amount of his liability.

Premier Abbott's Policy.

OTTAWA, June 19.—Premier Abbott announces that no special legislation will be introduced in Parliament, and that the policy of Sir John Macdonald will be continued.

STAMFORD, Conn., June 19.—Miss Lillian Skiddy, daughter of Gen. Skiddy, was married last night to William Parker, Jr., of New York. Ex-President and Mrs. Cleveland were among the guests.

HE HAD FOUR WIVES.

George Storms Now in Custody and Will be Tried for Bigamy.

BATAVIA, N. Y., June 19.—The grand jury, which has been in session for three days, brought in an indictment against George R. Storms, who lives near Holley, Orleans County, for bigamy.

He married Bertha Beach at Kendall, Orleans County, in July, 1889, and Ellen Myers at Batavia, on Jan. 25, 1891. The former wife, learning of this marriage, came to town yesterday and applied for a warrant for his arrest, and the facts were brought before the grand jury, which was in session.

Evidence was also adduced showing that he was married in Missouri in 1870 and also a fourth time elsewhere and that no one of the wives was dead or divorced. He was arrested at West Kendall, where he was working, and is now in custody.

SEABRIGHT'S SUFFERERS.

The Relief Committee Busy Distributing Food and Clothing.

SEABRIGHT, N. J., June 19.—Eugene Kelly, who was arrested here charged with arson, in having caused the fire which proved so disastrous on Tuesday night last, was taken to Freehold to await the action of the grand jury.

Committees for the purpose of obtaining funds for the relief of the sufferers have been formed a Long Branch, West End and Hollywood. Subscription blanks have been placed in all the banks of Long Branch and the Methodist Church is the busiest place in the village. The relief committee has its headquarters there. Wagon loads of food, furniture, bedding and clothing are constantly arriving from all parts of the county. From early morning until late at night people pass in empty handed and come out with food and other necessities. Clothing was in great demand to-day. A film of cold, disagreeable mist hung over the ruined village, and the ocean thumped the town with huge waves.

The President and Baby McKee, in his little sailor suit, walked over to the cottage, followed by all the party excepting Mrs. Harrison, George H. Williams and Mary Lodge McKee. They were received at the cottage by a few Cape May friends, who had gathered on the train. Flowers beautified every room in the cottage. On Tuesday the President will return to Washington.

WAS IT A FINISH?

Billy Madden Disputes Referee Dunn's Slavin-Kilrain Decision.

NEW YORK, June 19.—Discontent continues to prevail and even grow among the sporting men of this city, over the decision of Referee Jere Dunn in the Slavin-Kilrain contest of Tuesday night.

Billy Madden is so positive that the referee was wrong that he is willing to stake \$100 on the issue he presents and leave the question to be decided by a majority vote of three sporting papers which he names, Spirit of the Times, Clipper and Police Gazette.

"A referee cannot reverse his decision as Mr. Dunn did," said Mr. Madden. "When he decided that Slavin won the fight, he practically decided that Kilrain was knocked out."

"The fight was to be on for 10 rounds and only a knock-out could end it before those 10 rounds were ended. Now, if there was no knock-out, those 10 rounds are yet to be finished, and the decision didn't go."

The point that Mr. Madden makes, then, is that Kilrain was knocked out inside the 10 rounds, and his wager of \$100 is that all bets made that such would be case were won.

Mr. Madden is one of a large body of sporting men whose views of the case he voices, though he speaks only for himself.

"Kilrain was down 14 seconds," says Mr. Madden. "If he wasn't knocked out the whole fight must be gone over again under the conditions calling for 10 rounds."

The controversy is one of the most interesting which ever arose over a ring contest.

Perth Amboy Wants the Water Works.

PERTH AMBOY, N. J., June 19.—An application will be filed in court to-morrow by Corporation Counsel Beckman for a Commission of Councils to determine as to whether or not the water works, franchise and appurtenances of the Perth Amboy Water Company. Recently the city offered the company \$50,000 for its plant and franchise, which was rejected.

Ex-Gov. Forsaker Sells 7,000 Acres.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., June 19.—Ex-Gov. J. B. Forsaker of Ohio disposed of 7,000 acres of prairie land in South Arkansas, which he purchased several years ago. The land was bought by Messrs. Nickles and McCammon, who will convert the tract into a ranch. The price paid was \$10 per acre.

Judge Barker's Successor.

BOSTON, June 19.—At a meeting of the Executive Council Gov. Russell nominated Elisha Burr Maynard of Springfield for Judge of the Superior Court vice Judge Barker, promoted.

Run Over by a Train and Killed.

BIRMINGHAM, N. Y., June 19.—While lying asleep on the railroad track at Whitney's Point, last night, Thomas Homer of Lisle was run over by a coal train and killed.

WILMINGTON, Conn., June 19.—The quo warranto proceedings against Chief J. H. Lands were argued in the Superior Court on a motion to dissolve. Judge Thayer will give his decision this afternoon.

Shot by a Train.

WHOLESALE SMUGGLING.

Carried on by a Pullman Car Conductor for Ten Years.

WASHINGTON, June 19.—For some time past the United States Customs authorities have been aware that considerable smuggling was going on between Montreal and Boston. They quite recently set a watch to discover the smugglers and have been rewarded by making a most important arrest, the culprit being Kilburn J. Brown, sleeping car conductor on the Canadian Pacific Railway between Montreal and Boston.

The customs people say that for the last ten years Brown has defrauded the United States Treasury Department out of \$100,000 by running in contraband articles of wearing apparel, opium, furs, silks, velvets and C. goods, packages of which were of great value and embargoed 75 per cent. of their real value.

Brown's modus operandi was to fill the pillow boxes with the contraband goods and drop them at different points of the route or to carry them direct to Boston, where the owners would be waiting to receive them.

The express companies have also suffered loss by packages carried. The United States Deputy Collector at Montreal attaches considerable importance to the arrest. During his stay in Montreal Brown put up at the best hotel and took the greatest possible enjoyments of life.

The News About Hippolyte's Death.

NEW YORK, June 19.—The Haytian Minister, Haenfler Price, declares that there is not the slightest foundation for the statement that President Hippolyte of the Haytian Republic has been shot. He has received mail from Port-au-Prince of a later date than the time of the alleged shooting, and his advices indicate that everything is tranquil there, and government and business affairs are transacted in their normal manner.

The Conservatives Defeated.

LONDON, June 19.—The government met a defeat last night on the question of factory labor. Mr. Sydney Buxton, Liberal, of London, had offered an amendment to the Factory bill to prohibit children under 11 years of age from working in factories. The government opposed the amendment, which was carried, however, by a vote of 203 to 160, several Conservatives voting with the majority.

Purged His Father's Name.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 19.—Hamilton Jureth, the 13-year-old son of a prominent lumber dealer of this city, was taken to May's Landing last evening to await trial at the September term of court on a charge of forging his father's name to a check for \$15, the money being used to defray his expenses in last week's Century Bicycle Club run, he being a participant.

An American Ship Wrecked.

LONDON, June 19.—The American ship Anahuac, Capt. Wheldon, from Newcastle, N. S. W., bound in the direction of Fading, has been wrecked in Brattaba Bay Straits. No lives were lost. The Anahuac sailed from Boston and was owned by Edward Lawrence. She registered 1,221 tons.

Bodyard Killing Arrives from Europe.

New York, June 19.—Rudyard Kipling arrived in New York on the City of Paris. He is traveling incognito, as his health does not permit him to see the many visitors who would like to call on him. He will spend a few weeks in the country with some friends.

Dying of a Crushed Finger.

PENNY ARMS, N. J., June 19.—While coupling cars in Elizabeth one week ago, Patrick Galvin, a brakeman in the employ of the Central Railroad Company, had one of his fingers crushed. As a result of the injury he is dying of lockjaw at his home in De Kalb avenue.

For Slavin and Sullivan.

OMAHA, Neb., June 19.—A purse of \$25,000 has been offered by the Magic City Athletic Club for a finish fight between Slavin and Sullivan. A \$10,000 bond was filed in bank for faithful performance.

Bodies Horribly Mutilated.
