MINING MATTERS.
Topics of the Times on Mine Work.

It is said that the P. & R. C. & I. Co. has 325,000 tons of coal of all sizes stored in its stock yards at Mahanoy City and Port Richmond.

John C. Glover, who, for some time past, has very acceptably filled the position of assistant outside foreman of the Wm. Penn colliery, has been promoted to fill the position of outside foreman of the colliery, to succeed Benj. D. Boddall, who has resigned, to take charge of the Boddall Bros' big plant at Gilberton. Mr. Boddall was an excellent foreman and in Mr. Glover the colliery has a good successor.

Nathan Roberts, of town, has about completed his contract for sinking the new shaft in the Hammond colliery. He expects to finish it next Wednesday. Prominent mine officials say that the shaft is one of the finest pieces of work north of the Broad mountain. It has a depth of 895 feet and is timbered throughout.

Mine Inspector Stein has received from the state mine inspection department an ingenious apparatus for testing mine gas and he experimented with it in his office yesterday afternoon for the first time. A number of gentlemen witnessed the experiment and they agreed with the inspector that the apparatus is a success.
