HE IS STILL FREE

Armed Men Chasing the Columbus Grove Robber.

MURDER ADDED TO HIS CRIMES.

So Far the Search for the Desperado Has Proved Unsuccessful.

Several Experienced Detectives Have Joined in the Chase—The County and Town Officers—He Stole a Horse from a Pasture—A Belief that He Took a Train at Findlay.

COLUMBUS GROVE, Ohio, Aug. 10.—Early in the morning the men in pursuit of the fugitive bank robber, and now murderer, were awake and resumed the chase of the criminal.

William Vandemark, the farmer shot Saturday, died at 4 a. m., and by his death the hunt was given to the man-hunters and a stronger determination that he should be taken dead or alive.

Word was received by telegram that he had been traced to a small area near Beaver Dam, a small village eleven miles south of this place, and to that point everybody who could get a vehicle went.

Reward Offered. A reward has been agreed upon and is offered as follows: The county offers \$500, the municipality \$250, and the bank \$300.

Latest Work of the Desperado. A later report says the desperado is beyond reach, and it is questionable if he is ever caught at all.

It is highly probable that the hunted man has made his way into Findlay, jumped a train, and is by this time far away.

It was noon before the theft of the horse was discovered and later when his direction was learned. Hundreds of men were in the chase to-day where there were 10 yesterday.

FARMER EVANS IS GONE. Claims amounting to \$10,000 are held against him.

HARDONFIELD, N. J., Aug. 10.—The flight of Samuel Evans, one of the best known farmers in Camden County, is the sensation of the day in this vicinity.

It is said that claims amounting to fully \$10,000 are held against him. Evans had a fine large farm on the White Horse Pike, about three miles out of Camden.

His outbuildings were of the most pretentious kind, and everything he purchased was of the best.

It was the discovery of a forged note that precipitated his flight. The note was for \$250, payable at the National State Bank, Camden, and purporting to have been made by Louis Matlock, a well known Burlington County farmer.

The paper went to protest, and Mr. Matlock, on being notified, pronounced it a forgery.

In a letter to his wife Evans wrote: "MANY of us are left of your father's estate is what is in the house. You had better sell it and pocket the money."

As soon as the news of Evans' flight became noised about there was a hasty comparison of notes by the farmers and business men, and it was then learned that Evans had secured considerable money before he departed.

Philadelphia merchants with whom the farmer had business relations are said to be among the number. On the day he left he entered the office of Shivers & Moffett, the Camden lumber dealers, and made a fruitless effort to get an exchange of checks.

White Caps Sued for Damages. KIDNAPERS, Ind., Aug. 10.—John F. Abbott and Edward Benson, both of whom have been handled roughly by alleged White Caps in the suburb of Houghville, have brought suit for damages against fifteen prominent citizens of that place, charging them with participating in the outrages and demanding heavy damages.

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A PECULIAR PEOPLE

The Economite Society Becoming Spiritualists.

CONVERTED BY MRS. EMMERTS

She Hails from New York and Professes to Be Wealthy.

Several of the Members Greatly Excited—Many of the Conservatives Frightened—They Say the Woman Has Designs on the Society's Wealth—Trustee Duss Explains His Newly-Formed Ideas.

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 10.—The Economite Society has been greatly excited for several weeks over the advent of Mrs. Frances E. Emmerts, a spiritualist's medium and the expounder of peculiar scientific principles.

The fact that her views have been accepted by Trustee Duss, who has been selected as the future head of the society, and seemingly silently approved by Father Hearst himself, has added terror to the astonishment of the conservatives and created a fear among some of them that their religious doctrine, so firmly upheld for nearly a century, may now be modified by an influx of strangers.

Mrs. Emmerts is about 40 years of age and claims to be a great traveler. She professes to be wealthy, and is credited with sincerely in her belief. She says her home is in New York. She left Economy on Friday, but is expected to return in a few days. Trustee Duss has fully accepted her views. Speaking of them he said:

"We are told that God is everywhere. We are also told that the earth is round and that we live on the outside. Now imagine a god who can fill all this incredible space. The idea is absurd. We know that the earth is round; that has been conclusively proven; but it has not been proven that we live on the outside by any means.

"The fact is that the earth is a hollow ball and we live on the inside. Computing scientifically the crust is 100 miles in thickness. On the top or outside part we find the different formations all mixed up, but on going deeper everything is in exact layers. The sun is in the center. Lines of force are continually rushing from the earth to the center. They flow there and form our sun, which has a dark side. Lines rush back and are met by other forces and the meeting of these forms our stars, just on the same principle as electric light is caused. Each one of us has his own particular star. There are no planets. As the old system tells us, simply these points of light. We have proof in the Testament for this belief in a particular star for each of us. Did not Christ have His star? We can also prove from the Bible that we live within the earth and not on the outside."

Continuing, Mr. Duss indicated his belief that spirits sometimes return to earth and converse with friends left behind. The few members of the society who have not accepted the views of Mrs. Emmerts openly declare that she is an impostor, and that she has designs on the society's wealth, which is very great.

Owing to the growth of celebrity taken some years after settling at Economy there are now no children there. Little old men in light blue jackets, or women clad in Norman cap and striped gowns, may be found in the streets, but that is all.

Discovery of a Conspiracy to Destroy Two Chilean Vessels.

LONDON, Aug. 10.—Startling information is in possession of the Chilean Legation in reference to a conspiracy to destroy the two Chilean ironclads, Presidente Pinto and Errazuriz.

It appears that the sum of \$3,000 was offered to an English maritime officer, in the service of the Chilean government, if he would undertake to blow up the Errazuriz. He refused the offer with indignation.

While the vessel was in the harbor of Lisbon suspicious boats were seen approaching on several occasions at night, but the careful lookout on the vessel kept them at bay. There was no doubt a purpose to explode the vessel at Lisbon.

While the Presidente Pinto was at Toulon a party of men attempted to join the crew. They looked so unlike ordinary sailors, two of them being unable to conceal their refinement of manner, that suspicion was aroused, and the commander concluded to reject them, although in need of men. Proof afterwards came to his knowledge that these men had been engaged to sink the ship.

There is also reason to believe that the ransacking ground at Toulon was owing to treachery. The commander was so convinced of this that he sent a report to that effect to Paris.

The Errazuriz is already safe at sea, and it is understood that the Pinto will soon be in a position to follow, and that their arrival in Chili will put an end to the revolution.

Great Bench Show.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Aug. 10.—Arrangements are all complete for a great bench show, to be held under the auspices of the New York Kennel Club. General Hampton of South Carolina will be present with his celebrated pack of hounds to engage in fox chases.

The race track will be enclosed and hurdles will be placed across the same for hunters. All in the chase will be dressed in English hunting costume.

President Hanna Asked to Resign.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Aug. 10.—The seven clubs in the base ball association have signed a paper requesting President Hanna of the Cincinnati club to resign.

The seven clubs own and support the Cincinnati club. The president gets a salary of \$300 a month. He is considered useless, hence the request for his resignation. There is trouble in the wind.

The Shot Proved Fatal.

BOSTON, Mass., Aug. 10.—Thomas F. Hart, who was shot by John B. Church last Monday night, died last night. Church will be arraigned on the charge of murder this afternoon.

Spain Asked to Arbitrate.
