**G. A. R. Notes.**  
Mt. Carmel veterans are not meeting with the success they expected in raising money to do the handsome thing to the visitors on Grand Army Day. Nevertheless the boys will manage to get enough to eat and drink.  
All that the veterans of the Army of the Potomac want to know, in order to make them flock to Washington next year, is that the provost guard has been abolished, and the old central guard-house has been torn down.  
A committee, with Davy Morgan as chairman, has been appointed by Post 146 to make arrangements for transportation, etc., to Mt. Carmel on Grand Army Day. It was a big time for Gen. Alger. He planned wisely, worked hard and spent his own money lavishly to make the National Encampment the grand success that it was. The comrades all understood and appreciated this, and the measure of their gratitude to him was overflowing. His appearance anywhere was the signal for enthusiastic cheering. More than any other man in the order he has taken the place of the lamented Logan in their affections.  
There is considerable talk among the veterans about abolishing Grand Army Day. To some posts it has become a burden, but as long as it is celebrated the "boys who wore the blue" will make it their duty to celebrate it. In a year or two it will be a hard matter to get any of the towns in the district to accept the honor on account of the expense connected with the day.

**CITIES OF THE UNION.**  
Interesting Comparisons Published by the Census Office.  
WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—The Census Office has just issued a bulletin on the social statistics of cities of the United States. The returns are yet incomplete, but the statement comprising 50 of the cities is given.  
From the tables it appears that the annual cost of each gas lamp in cities varies from \$50 in New Orleans to \$17.50 in Hoboken, while the annual cost of each electric lamp varies from \$40.07 in San Francisco to \$65 in Chicago.

The bulletin shows that gas lamps comprise more than 60 per cent. of all classes used for street lighting, but are rarely used exclusively for that purpose. In cities of less than 100,000 inhabitants there is an average of 3.75 patrolmen to the square mile and 4.03 miles of street to each patrolman who makes annually an average of 51 arrests. The cost of the force to each head of population is \$0.78, varying from \$1.96 in New Haven to \$0.60 in Nashville.

The average death rate in the police force of all the cities is 55 per 1,000, varying from 107 per 1,000 in Lowell, and 133 per 1,000 in Hoboken to 13 per 1,000 in New York city, 15 per 1,000 in Minneapolis and 132 per 1,000 in Hartford.

In twenty-two cities of over 100,000 inhabitants each the average annual cost of the fire department to each head of population is \$0.81, varying from \$1.78 in Boston and \$1.06 in New York city to \$0.64 in Chicago, \$0.60 in Philadelphia, \$0.70 in Brooklyn, \$0.62 in St. Louis, \$0.35 in Baltimore, \$1.15 in San Francisco and \$0.93 in Cincinnati.

In twenty-one cities of over 100,000 inhabitants each the total loss by fire during 1889 was \$2.20 to each head of population, ranging from \$8.97 in Buffalo, \$3.32 in St. Louis and \$3.11 in Brooklyn to \$1.11 in Baltimore, \$1.02 in Newark and \$0.58 in Washington.

**IRON WORKERS STARVING.**  
Thousands of Men Thrown Out of Work in England.  
LONDON, Aug. 15.—Owing to the depression in the iron trade operations at the Cumberland district have been suspended for some time past, and the inability of the workmen to procure employment is causing the most acute distress.  
Six thousand men have been thrown out of employment, and a large number have earned nothing for a year. Many families have struggled along, hoping for better times, but hope of the works again starting up has been abandoned now, and the outlook for the coming winter is one of the gloomiest nature.  
The families of the iron workers—men, women and children—show traces of the privations they have suffered, and it is an absolute fact that hundreds of them are on the verge of starvation.  
So serious has the situation become that the authorities have decided to start public works to give employment to the many idle men in the district and thus avert the famine which is threatened.

**MURDERERS AT LARGE.**  
The Hope Fugitives Said to be Hiding in New York State.  
BELVIDERE, N. J., Aug. 15.—The coroner's inquest in the Hope murder case has been adjourned until Monday next, when important evidence is expected. It is now definitely known that the murderers are hiding in the mountains in New York State. They have been seen, and no doubt will be captured before many days.  
The negro arrested cannot be identified and has been discharged. Some new developments are expected very soon that will throw some light on the identity of the murdered man.

**Alms House Report.**  
The regular monthly meeting of the Directors of the Poor of Schuylkill Co. was held at the Alms House, Aug. 11, 1891. Present Wm. Leninger, Thomas J. Tracy, Charles R. Kane. Census of the house for month ending July 31, 1891: Number of inmates in the house July 1, 1891, 437; number of inmates in the house Aug. 1, 1891, 433; decrease during last month, 4; number of inmates in house Aug. 1, 1890, 419; number to same time this year, 433; increase during last year, 14. Of the above 81 are insane and idiotic; 143 under medical treatment, 10 children. Admitted during the month, 28; discharged and absconded, 27; bound out 0; born, 1; died, 6; lodging and meals were furnished to 79 tramps. Outdoor relief was granted to 420 families, amounting to \$3,140.11; bills were read and orders were drawn Aug. 11, 1891, amounting to \$3,234.01; previous issue, \$47,855.95. Total in 1891, \$50,589.96. J. J. O'CONNOR, Clerk.
