REGION ROUND.
A Budget of Interesting Articles on all Topics.

Maggie McAvoy, a young lady 16 years old residing at Mt. Carbon, was struck and instantly killed Saturday evening, within sight of her own home, by a Reading passenger train.

William Jacobs, a well-known resident and business man of Tamaqua, was taken to the insane department of the Almshouse, at Schuylkill Haven, Mr. Jacobs only returned from the Danville asylum about six months ago, where he was treated and it was thought he had fully recovered. He is growing weak and it is feared that he cannot live long.

A stranger who registered as E. W. Toney, took a room at the Merchants' Hotel at Pottsville late Friday night. The odor of gas issuing from his room caused a guest to awaken and make an investigation. The man did not answer repeated knocks upon the door and John McManus, the night porter, entered the room through a hallway window. The man was unconscious and he was removed to an open window where he soon revived. In lifting his insensible form a canvas bag securely tied to his back and filled with watches was discovered. He left the hotel in the morning and mysteriously disappeared. He was a young man of genteel bearing, and nothing has been heard of him since.

By the 1st of January, next, the Hazleton branch, between Lotts and Hazleton, and the Port Reading branch, between Bound Brook and Port Reading, will be completed.
