

# IS SHE HIS WIDOW?

## A Woman Who Says She Was Millionaire Allen's Wife.

### CAME TO HIS GRAVE AT NIGHT.

#### Allen's Sister Denounces the Claimant as an Impostor and Adventuress.

The Millionaire Popularly Supposed to Have Been Unmarried—The Woman Said to Have Proved Conspicuously That She Was Allen's Legal Wife—She Went Over the Grave of the Deceased Until Guards Drove Her Away.

ADUPTA, Me., Oct. 7.—When E. C. Allen, the millionaire publisher, died on Aug. 9 last he was supposed to be an unmarried man and his vast fortune was being divided among his relatives until a very recent date, when a woman appeared with papers in support of her declaration that she was the wife of the dead millionaire.

The manner of her appearing added to the mystery of the case. Two guards were stationed at the grave to frustrate any attempt to steal the body. On the night following the funeral a woman heavily veiled appeared at the grave at about midnight. She threw herself upon the grave and wept bitterly for about half an hour. The two guards, thinking she was a member of the family, did not interfere, and she was allowed to depart unmolested.

On the following night the woman again appeared at the same hour and again over the grave. This time she was challenged by the guard as she was about to depart. She attempted to run, but fell and was caught.

Her veil was torn by the fall and she was seen to be a beautiful woman. She detained in French an explanation of her detention. The guards told her what their instructions were. Then the woman said she was a relative of the dead man and had a right to be there. She was allowed to go.

The next day the guards told Mr. Allen's sister of this episode, and she denounced the woman as an impostor. Since then the woman has sought Miss Allen, and it is said, has proved conclusively to the latter that she was the legal wife of the late publisher. Members of the family refuse to talk about the matter.

Oscar Holway, one of the administrators of the Allen estate, says, however, that no woman has made any claim upon him for a share in the Allen estate as Allen's widow.

#### Methodist Local Preachers Adjourn.

#### Another Reservation to Be Opened.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—It is reported on good authority that the Nox Percees reservation will be declared open by the President in a very short time. This reservation lies in the heart of the Cherokee strip, just west of the Santa Fe Railroad, and is the richest land in the Territory. The tribe has had their lands allotted and there are over 500 quarter sections which the President can declare open at any time.

#### Brilliant Society Wedding.

BALTIMORE, Md., Oct. 7.—Dr. Robert Taylor, of the Johns Hopkins Hospital, and Miss Florence Tompkins, daughter of R. W. Tompkins, were married in Christ's Protestant Episcopal Church last evening by Rev. William Hedine, assisted by Revs. Kirkus and Graham. The church was packed to overflowing with Baltimore's most fashionable society.

#### Mr. Blaine Not Ill Again.

ADUPTA, Me., Oct. 6.—The report that Mr. Blaine is ill again is unfounded. The family physician, Dr. G. W. Martin, says that Mr. Blaine is in better health than when he arrived from Bar Harbor. McCormick Blaine, Emmons' little son, has been dangerously ill, and this fact probably gave rise to the rumor of the Secretary's illness.

#### Bell Telephone Suit.

BOSTON, Oct. 7.—The suit of the United States of America versus the Bell Telephone Company and Alexander Graham Bell, as to whether the patents of the latter were obtained from the Patent Office at Washington by fraud, came on before Henry L. Hallatt, who is an examiner in the case and is taking testimony.

#### The King of Wurtemberg Dead.

STUTTGART, Oct. 7.—The King of Wurtemberg died yesterday morning. He was 61 years of age, and ascended the throne in 1864. The heir to the throne is Prince Wilhelm. The King had attracted much attention of late years by his eccentricities.

#### NEW YORK NEWS IN BRIEF.

The Mohawk Indian Conference is being held at Lake Mohawk, this week.

A convention of typographical unions of New York State is in session in Syracuse.

Garrett J. Garretson was nominated for County Judge at the Queens County Republican Convention.

Two operations will be performed upon Lieutenant-Governor Jones' eyes in New York. He will have to stay indoors for a month.

The eighteenth annual convention of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union of New York State is in session in New York.

Miss Anne Johnston King, daughter of Mr. Charles King, late President of Columbia College, died in Paris Monday, of heart disease.

Prof. Charles F. Briggs, accused of heresy, has notified the New York Presbytery that he will present his side of the case November 4 next.

By a collision of a train and a wagon at Gifford's, Staten Island, yesterday, John Jones, his sister, Miss Carrie Edwards, her one-year-old baby, and Edward Hunter, Jones' employe, were killed.

# Wants \$174,000 for an Alleged Swindle.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 7.—A sensational suit has been commenced against the officers and stockholders of the United States Starch Company of Waukegan, Ill., by Silas W. Peatt, in which he says the officers of the company have defrauded him and others out of \$174,000, which they persuaded him and his friends to invest in the stock of the starch works. The swindle, it is alleged, grew out of the sale of patents for making dry starch, which are said to have turned out to be utterly worthless.

#### Editor Fined Six Cents.

POUGHKEEPSIE, N. Y., Oct. 7.—W. N. Tyler, editor of the Rhinebeck "Gazette," was on trial in the circuit court yesterday charged with criminal libel. In his paper Tyler censured Charles Van Steenberg, a Rhinebeck constable, for making an arrest without a warrant and charged the constable with being intoxicated at the time. The jury brought in a verdict of guilty, and Tyler was fined six cents.

#### How Arizona Stands.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—The annual report of N. O. Murphy, Acting-Governor of Arizona, shows that there is fully \$70,000,000 taxable property in Arizona. The total indebtedness of the Territory is placed at \$855,280, and the indebtedness of several counties, \$2,175,805. The estimated output of copper is placed at 30,000,000 pounds; gold \$1,812,955 and silver \$1,383,355.

#### Suit for Infringing on "Extra Dry."

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—Peter Herman von Mumm and Max Von Guaita of Frankfurt, Prussia, and Alexandre de Bary of Reims, France, have begun suits in the United States Circuit Court against Morris Loeb of this city for infringement of their trade mark on their "Extra Dry" champagne.

#### Confesses to Wrecking the Train.

NEW LONDON, O., Oct. 7.—William Canfield has confessed to having turned the switch which wrecked the limited train on the Pennsylvania road at New Palestine, a few weeks ago, in which three men were killed. He says that he attempted to wreck the train to plunder it. He is now in jail here.

#### Lives Lost Off France.

PARIS, Oct. 7.—Many boats and lives have been lost owing to the severe storm at Brest.

#### NEW ENGLAND BRIEVITIES.

Senator Hoar has inaugurated a movement at Worcester, Mass., to raise a statue to Gen. Devins.

William McKay's boat building shops and a large dry house at Newburyport, Mass., were burned yesterday.

While on his way to a funeral at Norwich, Conn., the Rev. George Cryer, aged 74 years, died in his carriage. With one hand he was holding the reins and with the other his bible.

Fifteen hundred live hogs were roasted to death during a fire in J. P. Squire & Co.'s packing establishment in Somerville, Mass. The flames caused a damage of about \$150,000.

#### Methodist Ecumenical Conference.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—The Methodist Ecumenical Conference, which opened here today, is to be one of the most remarkable religious gatherings ever convened in the United States. The Ecumenical Conference, as its name implies, is composed of the representatives of all the various branches of Methodism established throughout the world. This will be only the second conference of the kind, the first having been held in London ten years ago. The London gathering was a great success, to which the American delegates largely contributed. The conference here will be on a larger scale.

#### Christian Endeavor Convention.

WILLIAMSPORT, Pa., Oct. 7.—Over 600 delegates were in attendance when the fifth annual convention of the Christian Endeavor Union opened here last evening. Rev. Julius A. Herold, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, delivered the address of welcome. Dr. Herold of Altoona, vice-president of the Union, responded. The address of President Rev. George B. Stewart of Harrisburg, was the event of the evening. Receptions were held at a number of the city churches. The meeting will continue to-day and to-morrow.

#### The Veiled Prophet Celebration.

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 7.—Last evening the great pageant of the Veiled Prophet passed through the principal downtown streets to the Chamber of Commerce. His Highness was tendered a reception and ball at which the beauty, wealth and aristocracy of St. Louis were handsomely represented. The subject chosen for the floats in the pageant was scenes from the works of popular writers of fiction. There were twenty-two floats in the procession, each float drawn by four horses, and in beauty of design and decoration surpassed all tableaux of previous years.

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#### PENNSYLVANIA BRIEFS.

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Daniel, the 15-year-old son of Rev. A. L. Chittenden of Oribolonia, Pa., fell from a tree yesterday a distance of 45 feet and was instantly killed.

A woman from Brooklyn, N. Y., has been sentenced in Reading to two years in prison and to pay a fine of \$50 for passing counterfeit money.

James Brennan, aged 95, a section boss on the Lehigh Valley road, was struck and killed by a passenger train at Big Mine Run, near Ashland, yesterday.

# POOL ROOMS RAIDED.

## An Effort to Break Up the Business—Commissioners a Myth.

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—The police raided the pool rooms yesterday and arrested thirty-five persons interested or employed in the rooms. This action on the part of the authorities was the result of a consultation between Inspector Byrnes and District Attorney Nicol.

Hitherto under existing judicial decisions the pool rooms have been enabled to do business on the supposition that the transactions were on a commission basis and that orders given in the rooms would be telegraphed to agents at the track where they would be executed. Of course it was well known that none of the money taken in at the rooms found its way to the track, but this was difficult to prove.

The Inspector tried a plan whereby he expects to get several convictions and thus break up the pool room business. He had men at the track and others in all the pool rooms and they accurately noted the time the horses started at the track and up to what time the pool rooms took bets on the races.

In this way it is hoped to prove money was taken in on races at the rooms after the horses had started in the different events, and thus show that the commission business is a myth.

#### ALL HOPE ABANDONED.

No Possibility of Finding the Entombed Miners Alive at Glencairn.

POTTSDAM, Pa., Oct. 7.—All hope has been given up of reaching the entombed miners alive. The work of the rescuing party is very slow on account of the treacherous condition of the roof, which threatens to fall at any moment. Superintendent Kelly, who was injured in the cave-in Saturday, is directing his men, in spite of the fact that his brains give him much pain. Michael Grant, who had his skull crushed in, is dying.

The relatives and friends of the entombed men refuse to give up hope and still linger about the mouth of the slope. Their faces light up eagerly when any one emerges from the mine, but a simple shaking of the head is sufficient to make them relapse into a condition of watching and waiting.

The coroner yesterday impaneled a jury and began an investigation into the disaster. The body of one of the victims was viewed, but the jury reserved its verdict and was continued until after the bodies of the other six men are recovered. The jury will also investigate the rumor that the Philadelphia & Reading Coal and Iron Company, the operators of the colliery, neglected the usual precautions to prevent such an accident.

#### German Day Celebration.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—German Day was celebrated in Washington with appropriate ceremonies. A large military, civic and trade procession paraded the streets of the city, being reviewed by the President as it passed the Executive Mansion, and disbanded at the Scheutens Park, where a promenade concert and varied amusements took place. Hon. L. W. Haberman, Fifth Auditor of the Treasury delivered an address in German, and Hon. Simon Wolf, ex-Congressman to Egypt, followed with a speech in English. A pyrotechnic display concluded the day.
