### REGION 'ROUND.

A Budget of Interesting Articles on all Topics.

A number of sets of timber fell out of the hoisting slope at the Keystone colliery Thursday. The accident is quite a serious one and it will necessitate the shutting down of all work at the colliery for an indefinite time. The slope is closed up tight, and it will be quite a hazardous undertaking to open it again.

Leyshon Davis, a Welsh tin worker, employed at Anderson, Indiana, has sent Thomas Morgan, of Miner's Mills, a piece of the first sheet of tin manufactured in the state of Indiana. The tin is of the best quality and will equal anything of that grade manufactured in Wales.

One of the fiercest prize fights ever witnessed in Montour county took place at an early hour Friday morning a few miles from Danville. The contestants were Ben Wilson (colored), of Danville, Billy Fitzsimmons, of Pottsville. Both men balanced the scales at 145 pounds. In the first four rounds Fitzsimmons punished Wilson in a most horrible manner. In the fifth and sixth rounds Wilson showed great endurance and fought hard. In the seventh round Wilson knocked Fitzsimmons out of the ring and he failed to come to time. The referee announced that Fitzsimmons was "asleep" and then awarded the fight to Wilson. The mill was brutal in the extreme.

### Electric Sparks.

Frackville expects to have their electric light plant in working order November 1st. Gilberton and Mahanoy Plans will be lighted with electricity by the Frackville company in November.

There is some talk of building an electric railway from Frackville to Mahanoy Plane, the power being furnished by the Frackville company.

If the Centralia Electric Railway Company is not playing a big game of bluff, it will have its road through from Ashland to Centralia by Christmas.

Tamaqua wants to be connected by an electric railway with Coal Da'e, Lansford and Summit Hill.

An electric railway will be built from Maney Valley to Eagles Mere next summer.

The electric road between Catawauqua to Bethlehem, via Allentown, is a grand success and paying handsomely. New dwellings and factories are going up all along the line between these towns.
