Another Assault in a British Railway Carriage.

GREAT EXCITEMENT CREATED

The Man Was Arrested, and Narrowly Escaped Lynching at the Hands of the Infuriated Crowd - The Young Woman's Condition Critical.

LONDON, May 17.—Another one of those cases which has made the English railway carriage system notorious has just occurred. Miss Hannah Cordock, a young woman of good family, was assaulted yesterday in the compartment of a train on the Manchester, Sheffield & Lincolnshire Railroad, by a man named Windle.

When the train arrived at the East Retford station, the guard noticed that the door of Miss Cordock's compartment was open. He went to close it and found the young woman half lying in the corner of the seat.

She then told him that she had been assaulted by a tall man with a heavy moustache and wearing a light, checked suit. The man had jumped from the train, she said, as it was slowing up for East Retford.

A detective and three policemen were dispatched in search of the fugitive. They found him two hours later walking through West Retford and took him to the station, where Miss Cordock identified him.

Miss Cordock is hysterical, and showed symptoms of breaking down several times during her recital. She is under medical treatment, and her physician says she will be able to appear against Windle in court within three or four days.

She is described as a handsome blonde girl of medium height. The excitement in East Retford on account of the case is high, and when Windle was taken to jail a crowd of men and boys pressed close to the policemen and threatened to take him away and lynch him.

Important Inter-State Commerce Decision.

WASHINGTON, May 17.—The Supreme Court has unanimously decided that the issue by the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad of what are known as "party rate tickets" for the transportation of ten or more passengers on one ticket, at a reduced rate, are not in violation of the provisions of the inter-state commerce law, and therefore may be continued.

BOSTON, May 17.—James A. Montgomery, aged 45 years, a well-known opera singer, cut his throat with suicidal intent in the afternoon at Saville's Hotel.

ANIMALS FOR THE FAIR.

Peru to Send Living Specimens of Llamas, Alpacas and Paco-Vicunas.

The Peruvian commissioner has made special application to the government at Lima for the purpose of securing a display of living animals from that country. He suggests the importance of this matter to all breeders, especially of the animals peculiar to that region.

Willard D. Tiedel, the commercial commissioner sent out in the interest of the fair, has returned to the northern coast of Colombia and Venezuela. He was engaged in securing material for the proposed commercial exhibit, which will undoubtedly be of the greatest interest and value to all manufacturers and exporters in the United States.

MINES AND MINING.

An Innovation in World's Fair Exhibitions.

Considerable misapprehension exists both in this country and abroad as to the mines and mining exhibit which is to be made at the exposition. At world's fairs heretofore the mineral and allied exhibits have been shown in the manufactures building or in annexes to other structures occupied by exhibits having but remote relation to anything of the mineral description.

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THE EXPOSITION POST OFFICE.

Preparations for Handling a Mountain of Mail Matter.

The world's fair is to have a post office large enough to supply hourly mails to 150,000 exhibitors, and the force to manage it will be as large as that of the Milwaukee post office.

Mr. Stoddard was informed that it had been estimated that between 150,000 and 175,000 exhibitors would be at the fair. Tacking these figures the inspector estimated that between 300 and 400 post office employees would be required to handle the mails, this estimate including the carriers.

LIKE BEN HUR'S RACE

The Great Finish at the Brooklyn Handicap.

JUDGE MORROW'S PERFORMANCE.

He Won the Rich Stakes by Scarcely a Nose—Longstreet, the Favorite, Brought Up the Race—A Great Crowd, and a Notable York Event.

New York, May 17.—That favorites are not always winners was again demonstrated at the great Brooklyn Handicap yesterday afternoon. The great work of the winner of the \$25,000 stakes, Judge Morrow, is the great topic of discussion in all circles.

A more beautiful day for the running of the Brooklyn Handicap and the opening of the racing season could not have been had. It is hard to estimate the number present. There were certainly 20,000 people at the track, and they filled the grand stand, lawn and betting ring to overflowing.

The handicap candidates presented a pretty appearance as they paraded past the grand stand on their way to the post and they were greeted with rounds of applause and murmurs of admiration.

The horses were finally sent away with Longstreet in the lead. After him came Fairview, Pesarra, Raceland, Clarendon, Baugher, Judge Morrow, Russell, Portchester, Madstone, Kingmaker and George W. In the order named, but well bunched. Passing the stand, Fairview was leading by five lengths and was going at a tremendous clip, with the evident intention of making a runaway race of it.

At this point Judge Morrow began to "make his move, and McLaughlin endeavored to do so with the favorite, Longstreet, but failed, and the cry went up that the favorite was beaten.

Then began a terrific struggle to the wire, during which the crowd sat spell-bound. Both the jockeys and the horses strained every nerve, and it was uncertain which horse would win, so evenly did they appear to be matched at this exciting point in the race.

The fractional time of the race was as follows: First quarter, 0.28 seconds; half, 0.47 1-4; three quarters, 1.14; mile, 1.42 1-2; and mile and a quarter in 2.08 3-4.


