#### AN EXACT COPY.

The Proposition Submitted to Council by the Old Water Company. Many citizens have approached the officials of the Shenandoah Water and Gas Company, asking them why their company does not make some proposition to the Borough Council looking to the settlement of the existing trouble. Under these circumstances it is deemed wise to republish, for the benefit of those of our citizens who may not have read it, the proposition submitted by the old water company. The following is an exact copy as presented by the company to the Borough Council:

SHENANDOAH, PA., MAY 5, 1892.  
To the President and Members of the Borough Council:  
We hereby reassure you and the public at large that our offer heretofore made was given in good faith. We hereby repeat the proposition, viz: That the Water Company will cancel the judgment obtained in the suit against the Borough, pay the costs of suit and waive its right to claim for water supplied the Borough for fire purposes for the past two years, and give the Borough free water for fire protection; provided, the Borough abandons the proposed new water works, and that an agreement to that effect has been read and discussed, it was unanimously adopted by the Directors of said company.

#### OLD WAR HORSES.

History of "Baldy," General George G. Meade's Noble Steed.

The "old war horse," Gen. John Sedgwick, owned by Dr. Luther F. Halsey, of Swedboro, has just died, aged 34 years. He carried his owner in twenty-five battles, and was wounded in the neck at Po River in Grant's flank movement.

Col. Swayer, who was in town last week, gave the following interesting history of General Meade's war horse, "Baldy." He was raised on the western frontier and owned by Col. E. D. Baker, of the 71st (California) Regiment, P. V., and was purchased by Gen. Geo. G. Meade for \$160.

He was wounded in the nose by a piece of shell, and afterwards ridden by General Meade, first at the battle of Drainsville, December 20, 1861, and on two of the seven days' fight—at Mechanicsville, June 26, 1862, and Gettysburg, June 27, 1862. This noble steed passed through the campaign of Northern Virginia, participating in thirty-three battles. He had the misfortune to be shot through the right hind leg at the second battle of Bull Run, August 30. At Antietam, September 17, 1862, was shot through the neck and, after taking off his saddle and bridle, was left for dead on the field; shortly afterwards John Marley, Gen. Meade's body-servant, found "Baldy" quietly browsing on the battle-field, and after being well cared for, again accompanied his owner. On the third day's fight at Gettysburg "Baldy" was shot through the ribs, and this ball was supposed to have remained in his body.

At the close of the war he was sent home from Petersburg, Va., in charge of Geo. Melloy, of the 1st Penna. Cavalry; after remaining at the General's country seat for seven years was presented to John J. Davis, blacksmith, near Jenkintown, Montgomery county, Pa., who kept him with the greatest care, until he became so feeble that on December 16, 1882, a dose of poison from a friendly hand laid Gen. Meade's charger to rest. He survived his heroic master a full decade. He was thirty years of age at his death.

TO GETTYSBURG VIA PENNSYLVANIA RAILROAD. On Thursday, June 24, 1892, the "High Water Mark" Monument will be dedicated on the field of Gettysburg. This monument marks the highest point within the Union lines reached by Pickett's troops in the memorable charge of July 3d, 1863. The monument has been erected under the auspices of the Battlefield Memorial Association. The dedicatory ceremonies will be highly interesting, consisting of speeches, poems, music, and military exercises. A large number of veterans, both officers and privates, will be gathered on the historic field and the occasion will be a most memorable one.

For the benefit of those desiring to attend, the Pennsylvania Railroad Company will, on June 1st and 2d, sell excursion tickets from all principal stations on the lines to Gettysburg at a single fare for the round trip. Return coupons will be valid for use until June 4th, inclusive.
