To send an alarm open the box, pull down the hook once and let go. When an alarm is sent in the fire bell will sound the number of the box and repeat the alarm four times.

HOW TO LOCATE ALARMS.

If the alarm is sounded from box 15 the fire bell will strike one, then pause and strike five which will indicate that the fire is in the vicinity of No. 15 box. Every alarm is repeated four times.

ANOTHER MEETING OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

MEMBERS DISAGREE ON THE FILLING OF VACANCIES.

MORE APPLICANTS FOR POSITIONS

The Fixing of the Tax Rate Also Postponed—The White Street School Building to be Examined Again.



SPECIAL meetings of the School Board are becoming numerous. Last night another meeting was held and it was expected that the vacancies in the corps of teachers would be filled. This was not done, however, some of the directors wishing to delay action in that direction until it can be definitely known how many teachers will not apply for re-election.

At first but two vacancies in the corps were counted upon, but now they number three and it is said that another one will probably be made by a fourth resignation. It is understood that Miss Eisenhower is the fourth.

Messrs. Beddall, Davenport, Gable and Williams did not like the idea of adjourning without first filling the vacancies, and when the Democratic members would not agree to the proposition they left the meeting.

The fixing of the rate of mills was also postponed until an estimate of the board's probable income can be made.

The White street school building was the subject of discussion again. It was stated that an experienced architect of Harrisburg could be secured to make an examination of the building on a contingent fee; that is, if he found he could not save the building no fee would be exacted, but if he could devise plans by which the building might be saved he would ask for his expenses. It was decided to have an examination of the building made on the terms stated, but it will not interfere with the receipt of bids already advertised for.

The list of applicants to fill the vacancies in the corps of teachers now bears fourteen names. Misses Mary A. Fox and Gortia B. Hess are the two latest applicants. The next meeting of the board will be held upon the call of the president.

The Steam Heating Plant.

The Shenandoah Heat and Power Company yesterday commenced work for the introduction of its system for heating buildings of town with steam. A dozen men yesterday started the excavations for the pipes at the corner of Lloyd and Bowers street and by night they had a ditch 30 inches wide and 5 feet deep dug to the corner of Plum alley and Lloyd street. The company advertised for bids for the digging, but after opening them concluded to have the work done by day labor. This afternoon the ditch had been pushed near the rear of the White street school building, on Plum alley. It is proposed to lay the pipe along East Centre street to Main and along the latter street north and south of Centre street. The pipe will be laid in sections of 300 feet long and each section will be filled as the pipe is laid.

They Settled.

A hearing in the Jones-Stout case was heard last night and resulted in a settlement by which both parties paid the borough fine and costs.



LOCAL MATTERS BRIEFLY CHRONICLED

BOTH INTERESTING AND INSTRUCTIVE READING.

A BRAKEMAN TAKES A BATH

The Joint Committee's New Industry Proves to be the Erection of a Large Brewery in Town.



An editorial in the June number of the Pennsylvania School Journal which I reproduced in these columns a few days ago, touching upon the interest taken by farmers and miners in the public schools, stated, "Formerly the miners seemed to care less than any other class for the education of their children. The boys and girls were put to work almost as soon as they could walk. Now this can no longer be done, under penalty of a heavy fine." The theory of the writer is very incorrect. So far as this section of the mining region is concerned girls have never been employed about the collieries. The condition of the public schools of Shenandoah is such as is produced by bona fide interest and through no fear of any law. There are no people in the state who take more interest in the public schools than the miners of this section and it is hardly fair to say that the standard of our schools has been attained by reason of a law preventing the children from being bread winners.

The Supervisor is doing good work. South Jardin street has been greatly improved by filling up the large holes. There are other streets that demand his immediate attention, especially West Coal street, which is almost impassible. Keep up the good work, Mr. Supervisor.

Shenandoah has never received such a building boom as it now enjoys for many years. New buildings are going up all over town, while many old ones have been remodeled or otherwise improved. Carpenters are in great demand just now.

I was informed by a friend of the Joint Committee yesterday that the industry referred to in their circular was the establishment of a brewery in this town. He also states that Shenandoah will have one in a short while. His statement and that of the committee do not agree. The committee say the industry could not be located here for the want of water. I think the old company could supply all the water necessary for such an enterprise, as our supply of water is great, if not greater than that of Mahanoy City, which has a large brewery within its limits.

The many admirers of Actor Scanlan in this section will be pleased to learn that there are great hopes entertained that he will again resume his profession. His reason is gradually returning, and when spoken to seems quite rational.

The post office department at Washington will issue on July 1st what is termed the double postal cards. They will constitute the only means yet provided for the payment, in the international mail service, of return postage by the sender of a communication. They will probably be issued in the form of a folder, the two sides of which are alike. The sender writes on one side, folds the card, leaving the inside blank for the answer. This will be a great aid to international correspondence, especially in business circles. The cost will be four cents.

Lehigh Valley brakemen, as a rule, are not of a dundish nature. Sometimes you find one that is a strict disciple of Oscar Wilde. Yesterday, a young man who handles the brakes on a Lehigh Valley passenger train, came to town with the intention of purifying his system by a bath. He was directed by a friend to the dam on the hill, but the walk was too much for his "mother's pet." Finally this friend, who, by the way, is a well-known butcher, took his "nibs" to the slaughter house, presented a large hog box filled with the blue liquid, and directed Mr. Brakeman to proceed to divest himself of his clothing, and enjoy himself. The young railroad employe by this time had changed his mind in reference to taking a bath—and when the necessity again occurs he will take a tub.

A cow belonging to a Hungarian of town was struck and killed on the railroad near Kohinor Junction, Tuesday night. Almost before the carcass was cold the owner and a number of his friends had it loaded on a wagon and carted it home, where it was cut up and prepared for use. Yesterday afternoon a large hog was struck and killed on the railroad in front of the Herald office. The train barely passed

over the carcass when it was caught up by the owner, a Hun, and carried into the house. The people of the nationality named rarely fail to secure the bodies of the cattle and swine killed on the railroad and they make up their loss in steaks, roasts and hams.

The Borough Council will hold a regular meeting to-night and it is expected that steps will be taken to put the result of the election to increase the borough debt into force.

HERE AND THERE.

Interesting Items Concerning Different Sections of the Region.

Berks county school directors were frightened by the great exodus of teachers and have increased the wages and lengthened the terms in many places as an inducement for the teachers to remain.

The Saturday half holiday law, passed at the last session of the Legislature, went into force yesterday. The period affected by the law will end September 15th.

The painters in the Lehigh Valley shops, South Easton, are now painting the passenger cars after the style of the Philadelphia & Reading cars—dark olive, with gold trimmings. The lettering on the cars will be same as the old Lehigh Valley.

The citizens of Mt. Carmel have already subscribed upwards of \$150 for fireworks to be used in the public demonstration on July 4th.

The anti-Hebrew war on the part of Lithuanians has spread to Shamokin.

A lynching is reported to have occurred at Onedia, Luzerne county. John Sprolak, a Hungarian, stabbed his boarding mistress and disappeared. Three hours later his body was found at the bottom of a mine slope. The angered friends of the stabbed woman are suspected of lynching.
