TO EUROPE BY RAIL.

The New York Press says stranger things have happened in this world than would be the building of that railroad from Vancouver to Cape Prince of Wales in Alaska.

It is true that for a portion of the distance the line now under consideration would have to pass through British territory. But that fact presents no insuperable difficulty.

It is proposed either to bridge or tunnel the strait. Engineers long ago declared the project of spanning the narrow channel from Cape Prince of Wales to East Cape on the Siberian side entirely practicable.

When the projected road shall have been built along the already surveyed North American route and the Siberian line completed, and Behring Strait and the English Channel disposed of, it will be possible to travel all the way from New York to London in a palace car.

The trip could be made inside of a fortnight by fast express trains. It would not take any more time than was taken a few years ago by some very fair passenger steamers in crossing the Atlantic.


