THE ELECTRIC RAILWAY.

It is a Great Success, Despite the Efforts of Kickers.

When some of our townsmen predicted four years ago that an electric railroad would in time be in operation in this valley and prove a paying investment they were laughed at and called "boomers." The road was built, notwithstanding, under the most trying circumstances, and against the protests of that class of people who are always standing in the road of progress and seem unable to shake off mossbacked theories.

And what is the result of the persistent efforts of the enterprising people.

The Schuylkill Traction Company now have electric railways extending through both valleys from Leont Dale to Shenandoah and Mahanoy City and Girardville, the once sleeping town of the valley is rapidly coming to the front as Scranton No. 2 with its net work of electric railway branches. The average monthly receipts from the lines are increasing and last month 38,000 passengers were carried.

The road cost a considerable sum of money, but the level-headed men of means who have it in hand intend to spend much more until electric railway lines shall stretch to every point where there is any traffic.

There is not another electric road in the country that has such a small amount of stock on the market—not one-tenth is held by outside parties—and has such an excellent field for operation.

Some people who evidently have an intention of frightening those who do hold stock are industriously circulating reports that the road is in the hands of a receiver. This is absolutely false. The returns from the investment far exceed the most sanguine expectations of the promoters. It will not be long before the stock will run up above par and become gilt-edged. No one can gain anything by circulating reports to the contrary with a view to reducing the value of the stock, for all but one-tenth of it is held by those at the helm of the enterprise and they know better than outsiders what their holdings are worth.

No ear tubes will be required and the productions of the phonograph will be distinctly heard in all parts of the theatre. PHILADELPHIA, April 28.—The seventy-second anniversary of the birth of General Grant was observed here last evening by the Union League, with the annual dinner that the club gives in honor of the natal day of the great captain of the Union. The club had as its guests two of the most distinguished officers of the Confederate army, General O. O. Howard, whose corps held Cemetery Ridge at Gettysburg, and General James Longstreet, who commanded the right wing of Lee's army at the same battle.

Was Bent on Murder.

WARSAW, Ind., April 28.—On Tuesday at Wolf Lake, a small town near this city, Theophilus Pendleton, a miller, returned home drunk and started to quarrel with his wife, which terminated by Pendleton striking his wife on the left temple, killing her instantly. He then seized their 6-month-old babe from its cradle and pounded its head into a jelly. He then set fire to the dwelling and cut his own throat with a razor.

Wilmington Badly Scorched.

WILMINGTON, N. C., April 28.—A stubborn fire broke out yesterday afternoon in a building on Water street, formerly occupied by Hall & Pearsall, as a storage warehouse. The fire extended to the large wholesale grocery house of Stevenson & Taylor. The building was considerably damaged and the stock almost ruined by fire, smoke and water.

Hurlbutt Will Hang Almy.

LEBANON, N. H., April 28.—All doubts as to who will hang Almy, the murderer of Christie Warden, have been settled. Ex-Sheriff Brigham forwarded the death warrant to Sheriff Hurlbutt at the suggestion of Chief Justice Doe. The ex-sheriff claimed that he was entitled to hang Almy and collect fees therefor because Almy had been sentenced during his term of office.

Wrecked a Building Association.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., April 28.—It developed yesterday that Charles E. Hazely, secretary of the South Side Building Association, is short \$19,622 and is a fugitive in South America. The association assigned yesterday afternoon. Hazely has been active in building association matters for several years. He is about 35 years old and has a family.


