## More Encouraging News for the Republicans.

### SEVERN THE CONTROLLER

The Latest Reports Received This Afternoon Warrant the Jubilation of the Republicans—The Democrats Make Many Concessions, and Some of Them Give Up Their Entire Ticket.



THE latest reports concerning yesterday's election in Schuylkill county confirm the sanguine reports received this morning. The Republicans have gained an almost sweeping victory in the county. This afternoon the Democrats concede that all the Republican candidates, except Seltzer, Shortall and Bierstein are elected. They say that Weidman is elected by 100 majority, Toole by 51 and Scheurman by about 400, but this statement is based upon returns received and figuring done at the Democratic headquarters.

A report was circulated this afternoon to the effect that this claim had been conceded by the Republican headquarters, but such is not the case. The statement was that if the figures of the Democrats making the claim were correct Toole was elected, but when the official count is made enough mistakes may be discovered to show the election of the entire Republican ticket.

The defeat of Folmer has caused much surprise. During the early morning his election seemed a foregone conclusion, but the returns received up to noon changed the complexion of his case and this afternoon Mr. Folmer personally admitted that he was defeated.

#### HERE YOU HAVE IT.

The Latest Election News in a Nut Shell.

Diligent inquiry made late this afternoon by HERALD representatives at the various headquarters shows that the Judgeship, Recorder and Clerk of the Courts are now the only offices in dispute.

The Democrats claim Weidman's election by from 800 to 1,000 majority and Scheurman's by between 200 and 300. These claims are made at the Democratic headquarters. Among some of Toole's friends the claim is made that he is elected by 62 majority. On the other hand Shortall's friends claim 63 majority.

It was learned from a reliable source this afternoon that the Democrats who claim Toole's election have not figured on all the returns. In the rush this morning some of the returns got mixed and when these are rechecked the Democratic estimates may be squelched.
