Dr. Pope's Protest Snubbed.

COLUMBIA, S. C., Dec. 1.—In the house of representatives yesterday the protest of Dr. Sampson Pope, deposed independent candidate, against the election of John Gray Evans for governor, was thrown out. The house refused to even have it heard.

Death of Ex-Senator Brown.

ATLANTA, Dec. 1.—Ex-Senator Joseph E. Brown died at his home here yesterday afternoon, aged 73. He has been in feeble health for many months, but his death was not looked for so soon.

North Carolina's Returning Board.

GREENSBORO, N. C., Dec. 1.—North Carolina's state returning board is in session. Governor Carr presiding. There are very few allegations or irregularities. There are three congressional contests by Henry P. Cheatham (colored), Republican, in the Second district; Cyrus Thompson, Populist, in the Third district; and Charles H. Minton, Populist, in the Sixth district.

Heavy Sentences for Cook's Pals.

FORT SMITH, Ark., Dec. 1.—Thurman Balling, alias "Skooter," Jesse Snyder and Will Kears, all members of the Cook gang, were yesterday sentenced in the United States court. "Skooter" received thirty years and Snyder and Kears twenty years each in the house of correction at Detroit, Mich.

Children Burned at a Bonfire.

NEWARK, N. J., Dec. 1.—In the suburbs of Newark Maggie and Nellie Peyton and Harry and Minnie Karcher, children, were burned by a bonfire. (Maggie Peyton is dead and Nellie Peyton and Harry Karcher fatally injured. Pauline Kicks was fatally burned by a gasoline explosion.)

An Old Time Criminal.

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., Dec. 1.—Elihu Taylor, arrested here for burglary three weeks ago, has been identified as "Long" John Tracy, who served ten years in Clinton prison for implication in the Manhattan bank robbery.

A Maryland Murderer Taken Back.

COLUMBIA, Pa., Dec. 1.—Horse Cooper, colored, who is wanted in Elkton, Md., for the murder of his mistress on Nov. 18, was arrested here last night, and shortly afterwards officers left with him for Maryland.

Sentenced to Death for Assault.

ATLANTA, Dec. 1.—Adolphus Duman, the negro convicted last week of criminally assaulting Mrs. M. Sauer, a respectable white woman, was yesterday sentenced to hang at the jail on Jan. 11.

The Czarevitch Not Dead.

LONDON, Dec. 1.—A dispatch from St. Petersburg denies, upon official authority, the report of the death of the czarevitch, the Grand Duke George, and also says that he is not even in a critical condition.

Her Clothing Ignited by a Gas Jet.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—Mrs. Thomas Russell, a patient at the Garfield hospital, died yesterday from the effects of burns received Thursday night, due to her night clothes igniting from a gas jet.

A Venerable Princess Dead.

COPENHAGEN, Dec. 1.—Princess Louise, sister of the king of Denmark and aunt of the dowager empress of Russia and of the Princess of Wales, is dead, aged 74.

Local News Cleanings Condensed for Hasty Perusal.

The repairs and alterations at the English Baptist church will be completed in time for the Christmas holiday season. Sitko, the Hungarian who cut his throat at Yatesville and was removed to the Schuykill Haven almshouse, is out of danger.

Contractor McAdam has made openings at all the stops of the public water works pipe line in town to be ready for the test which is expected in about three weeks.

Rev. Robert O'Boyle, pastor of Trinity Reformed church, on West Lloyd street, will tomorrow evening inaugurate the novel idea of recording the names of all who attend the service.

Health Officer Miles says he will prosecute any person he catches throwing paper, excelsior, or other refuse on the streets or alleys. He says the warning he has given are sufficient to exonerate him from a charge of being severe.

OFFICERS OF THE HOUSE.

Several Candidates for Positions in the Fifty-fourth Congress.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—There are already several candidates in the field for the principal offices in the house of representatives of the next congress. Secretary Humphrey, of the Republican League of Clubs, is the latest aspirant for the clerkship, his competitors so far suggested being Secretary McKeen, of the Republican congressional legislative committee, Representative McDevell, of Pennsylvania and Representative Sanderson of Illinois.

General Henderson's name has also been mentioned in connection with the office of sergeant-at-large and he does not appear to have any objection to either of the places to make an effort for. It is also understood that Colonel H. C. Stevens, sergeant-at-large of the National Republican committee, would like to be made sergeant-at-large of the house.

For doorkeeper the name of Congressman Huth, of Tennessee, is being canvassed, and it is stated that the Kentucky Republican representatives will probably have a man for the office, though no name is mentioned.

In the clerkship contest it is considered probable that McDevell will have the support of the Pennsylvania delegation. Mr. Humphrey's home has heretofore been in Ohio, but his work for the league has taken him from the state. Captain McKeen will make his fight largely on the strength of the work he has done as clerk of the campaign committee.

Reducing Coal Production.

SHENANDOAH, Pa., Dec. 1.—The Delaware, Lakawanna and Western company has ordered their collieries on half time, in pursuance of the action of the coal sales agents in New York in restricting the output to half of that of last June. There is hope now that prices will be stiffened and further war averted.

HAZLETON, Pa., Dec. 1.—While playing at school at Levison, the clothing of 7-year-old Mary Scintilla caught fire. Before the flames could be extinguished she was burned to a crisp.
