Twelve Thousand Troops Under Arms at Brooklyn.

NO SIGNS OF COMPROMISE NOW. The strikers demand the reinstatement of all who have gone out, but this demand the officials of the company decline to accede to.

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Jan. 21.—Every effort to settle the strike of the trolley operators has failed without satisfactory results. The strikers, through their executive committee, have made concessions after concessions, and the only point upon which they stood out was that the companies should re-employ all their old men.

Yesterday was a day of great disorder. The city is virtually under military rule. Streets are blocked against pedestrians by soldiers, and anyone who stops to argue the point is told to walk around the block, and a glistering bayonet is held within inches of his face.

The various mobs that gathered at the car stables and all those along the tracks of the tied up lines contained 50,000 people. The switches were broken and obstacles heaped on the tracks; wires were cut at various points, and on the whole the day was full of petty annoyances for the railroad companies.

At 1:45 p. m. ten cars were ready, and as the clock struck 2 both civil and military forces made the move. A car rolled out of the shed and was switched on the track leading down to Fulton ferry.

A second block occurred near Saratoga avenue, and the cars were ordered back to the stable, all reaching East New York in a somewhat battered condition.

At 5 p. m. there was great excitement on Broadway in the eastern district, between Moor and Flushing avenue.

The police are of the opinion that the brick was not intended for Captain French, and that the missile was not thrown by one of the strikers, but by one of the sympathizers.

None of the cars on the lines where the strike is in force were run after 5 o'clock last night in response to the request of the police authorities.
