POLITICAL NOTES.

The Republicans of Berks county are booming R. H. Koch, Esq., for judge of that county. Philadelphia will elect delegates to the state convention to-day and is entitled to 70 in that body. The Hastings club is making extensive arrangements to attend the state convention on the 28th inst. Mr. Gilkeson wants to be judge and jury in saying who shall be seated as delegates in the state convention. The delegate contest in the First ward will be a spirited one. There are already six announced candidates. The other wards are not so active in this respect. Shenandoah's delegation to the Democratic county convention will be solid for M. H. Master for Controller, and they will make a demand for his nomination. The Democratic leaders recognize the necessity of placing a representative of the German element on the ticket, and with Mr. Master they will certainly add strength to their ticket. From a Republican point of view it would be better were some one else nominated.

The P. O. S. of A. Convention. The 30th annual convention of the Patriotic Order Sons of America of Pennsylvania will meet at Allentown on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, August 27, 28 and 29, and will be composed of between 800 and 1,000 delegates, representing 700 camps, and a membership of nearly 55,000. The three local camps will be represented. The delegates leave here next Monday. There will be excursions run on the P. & R. and Lehigh Valley railroads on August 28th, the day of the big parade, when it is expected 8,000 men will be in line. The friends of State President Huth, of Shamokin, insist on his being a candidate for re-election and he has consented to enter the race. He is one of the best known members of the order in the state and has done good service as state lecturer for two years, served as National President for two terms, national lecturer one year and is at present at the head of this powerful organization in Pennsylvania.

This same order has been issued several times before by the company, but has never been strictly insisted upon.

Revolutionists Routed in Ecuador. COLO, Colombia, Aug. 29.—Word has been received here that at Ambato, Ecuador, the government forces defeated Alfaro's followers after a five hours' fight. Ambato is about thirty miles north of Riobamba, and is on the direct line of retreat from Riobamba to Quito. A dispatch from Lima, Peru, on Aug. 16, said that word received there from Guayaquil, Ecuador, which is the headquarters of the Alfaro party, was to the effect that General Alfaro had defeated the government forces under Sarasti at Riobamba and had occupied that place. General Sarasti appeared to have been completely routed. The rallying of the government forces, so as to make a stand and check Alfaro's advance upon Quito, is the first setback which the revolutionary forces have received for a long time.

No Decision Until After the Election. TRENTON, Aug. 20.—Justice Van Syckle, of the supreme court, who, with Justices Lippincott and Magee, sat in the case contesting the constitutionality of the county elective judiciary bill, said to a reporter that a decision would not be rendered until the November term of court in the case brought to test the constitutionality of the county elective judiciary bill, under which county judges will be elected in New Jersey this fall. This means that the decision will not be rendered until after election.
