THE TURKISH TURMOIL.

Recent Developments Give No Assurance of Permanent Peace.

HAMIDIEH CAVALRY ATROCITIES.

It is Now Certain That They Have Destroyed Two Hundred Villages in the Province of Van, and Fifty Thousand People Are Homeless.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 12.—The two incidents which have constituted the center of international interest, the refuge of Kutah Said Pasha, ex-grand vizier, in the British embassy, and the refusal of the sultan to grant the firmans for the passage through the Dardanelles of the additional guard ships demanded by the powers, are practically relegated to history through their settlement by the return of Said to his own residence, and by the final granting of the firmans by the sultan.

How unimportant these incidents were in themselves is indicated by the fact that the intense condition of the public mind is not abated by their closing, and the watchful game of diplomacy is seen to go on as before. The intimate connection of the peace of Europe with the fate of the Turkish empire is not to be forgotten, nor is it to be lost sight of that this peace is dependent, as it has been for the past eighteen years, upon the accord of the great powers as to the methods and limits of the coercion which shall be exercised upon the sick man of Europe.

The visit of M. Nelidoff to the sultan on Sunday and his prolonged audience of him seem to have settled in his mind at last that, on the question of guard ships at least, the powers were in accord. M. Nelidoff then appealed to him in behalf of the czar to obviate the necessity of an ultimatum by granting the firmans. This from Russia evidently convinced the sultan that his game of delay was up.

Said's return to his own house was made in the carriage of Sir Philip Currie, the British ambassador, accompanied by the chief dragoman of the embassy. On the same evening that he returned the secret police that had been watching the embassy were withdrawn. Said Pasha wrote Sir Philip Currie a letter of thanks in which he said that after forty-three years in the public service and five in the position of grand vizier his health was broken and he was unable again to accept the office of grand vizier. He then mentioned the written assurances.

Finally, as Said's request to leave the country was still ungranted, and as he felt bound to attest his appreciation of his sovereign's personal assurances, he returned to his own house, the sultan consenting to grant his wish to be unemployed in an official post, and to enjoy complete rest and liberty. Sir Philip Currie has reiterated the latter desire on behalf of the British government. It is still feared, however, that Said Pasha will suffer from palace intrigues.

LONDON, Dec. 12.—A dispatch to The Times from Urmiah, Persia, says: "It is now certain that the Hamidieh cavalry have destroyed 300 villages in the province of Van. Fifty thousand homeless people are flocking into the city of Van, and the government is doing nothing to prevent further outrages."

A Vienna dispatch to The Times says: "News was received from Trebezdze today of fresh atrocities. The bishop and five ecclesiastics were burned alive while seeking refuge in a building. Fresh outrages have occurred in other parts of Asia Minor."

The Standard's Constantinople correspondent says: "The port is absolutely deserted by ministers who five days and night at the palace, where confusion reigns supreme."

A Daily News dispatch from Constantinople reports the arrest by palace officials and the subsequent liberation of the chief messenger of the British postoffice, who is an Armenian.

Uproar in the Italian Chamber. **ROME, Dec. 12.**—A disorderly scene occurred in the chamber of deputies over a discussion of the government's proposals for army enlistment. Signor Marazzi wanted to read an old letter from Premier Crispi containing an alleged inconsistency with his present attitude. The president of the chamber refused to allow the letter to be read, and a great uproar followed in the chamber. The sitting had to be suspended to restore order, but later it was resumed and the session ended quietly.

Three Serious Charges Against a Justice. **DETROIT, Dec. 12.**—Justice of the Peace J. Blair Simpson was yesterday held to the recorder's court on a charge of assaulting Miss Maud Wentland, a girl under the legal age of consent. Later in the day the grand jury returned an indictment against him for an attempted assault upon Miss Maggie Howlett. This is the third charge of a similar character upon which the justice will have to stand trial, and it is alleged that the end has not yet been reached.

Confessed to Killing an Indian. **DENVER, Dec. 12.**—Adjutant General Ward, of the United States army received a message from Fort Apache today stating that a man named Boice and two other men, names unknown, gave themselves up for trial on the charge of killing the Indian whose body was discovered on the Chique last Monday. The message stated the Indian was discovered in the act of robbing a store and was pursued by citizens.

Escaping Prisoner Shot Down. **LOUISVILLE, Dec. 12.**—In a rush for liberty at the workhouse yesterday afternoon James Howard, a negro, who led the escaping prisoners, was shot dead by the guards. The prisoner was being followed by a number of other convicts. The guards fired several shots in the air, and the ring leader was finally brought down by Guard Lynch, who has been arrested.

Invalid and Nurse Burned to Death. **TROY, N. Y., Dec. 12.**—A fancy goods store in Lansingburgh was burned yesterday. Mrs. H. E. Sitter, the invalid proprietor, and her nurse, Mary Harris, were burned to death. Their charred bodies were found in the ruins of the building. It is thought a lamp set fire to the bed clothing.

Hailed by Derivatives. **CAIRO, Egypt, Dec. 12.**—A band of dervishes, mounted on camels, has raided, plundered and partly burned Anendan, north of Wady Halfa. A detachment of cavalry has been sent in pursuit.



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NOTED CROOK ARRESTED

"Rev." Hammond Charged with Nearly Every Crime on the Calendar. **NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 12.**—Dr. William Hammond, charged with being a confidence man, bigamist, adulterer, abortionist and all round crook, was arrested here yesterday.

Hammond, it is stated, was born in Lachute, Canada, and was brought up a farmer. He married on reaching man's estate. He wife soon died, and then his career of crime commenced. In 1856 Hammond married Mrs. Brookway, widow of a prominent physician of Franklin Falls, N. H., and the members of the Free Will Baptist church made him their pastor. He swindled his wife out of \$3,000 and the people of the town out of several more. Later he traveled through Canada and then suddenly disappeared.

He was next heard of at Eureka, Cal., where he officiated as a minister, married one of his flock, had her life insured, and when she died suddenly collected the insurance and started on a tour of the world, visiting Honolulu, New Zealand, Japan and Cape Town, working every section for all it was worth. He married an estimable lady in Melbourne.

He then returned to the United States, and on July 20, 1881, his wife died suddenly. He was then practicing medicine. He returned to New Zealand in 1881, where he married again. The doctor once practiced at Bedford, Mass., Allentown, Pa., and in South Putney, N. Y. He claimed he had been a Catholic priest. In 1881 he was a Baptist minister in Wolf Lake, Ind., also a doctor; went thence to Indian Village, made a raise and left for other fields.

Mob Wanted to Destroy a College. **TOPEKA, Kan., Dec. 12.**—The recent revolting grave robberies in this city have aroused the people to the highest pitch of indignation, and last night a mob began forming in the streets, the avowed purpose being to burn the Kansas Medical college, in which the bodies of three well known women have been found recently, having been stolen from their graves soon after burial. The police had learned that there was a movement on foot to assemble a mob to sack the institution, and the faculty of the college called upon the police for protection. The students were all sent home and a large squad of policemen was detailed to guard the college building. The governor has ordered the infantry company at Lawrence to be ready to respond to a call at any moment.
