AMONG THE POLITICIANS.

A Few Notes About the Movements of Schuylkill County Statesmen.

Shenandoah will not be waiting for candidates next year.

Frank Job is mentioned in connection with the Recordship nomination.

Ben. Smith, the present Deputy Sheriff, will be a candidate to succeed Sheriff Scott.

The local fight for borough offices is assuming shape, and the contest will be a spirited one.

With the re-organization of the Republican League Friday evening, the campaign will be waged with vigor.

An effort is being made by many citizens of the Third ward to induce Councilman Thomas J. James to again stand as a candidate.

The Democrats will hardly come to Shenandoah for their candidate for County Treasurer. It will likely go south of the mountains.

James Emanuels, the present High Constable, announces himself in to-day's paper as a candidate for re-election, subject to the Citizens vote.

The Congressional fight will prove a spirited one. Among the Democrats Hon. Charles F. King, Watson F. Shepherd, District Attorney Ryan and Hon. James B. Reilly are mentioned.

William F. Keegan, the defeated candidate for Poor Director at the last election, has announced that he will be a candidate again for the same office on the Democratic ticket next year.

B. J. Yost says Shenandoah will get the nomination for Clerk of the Courts, and that his name will adorn the Republican ticket. Jeff knows a thing or two outside of the good qualities of a lamp.

And still there is no appointment made in the succession to the late Squire Monaghan. A man by the name of Reilly knows the successful applicant's name, but he won't tell. We think it will be Reilly.

Senator John J. Coyle is a candidate to succeed Congressman Brunson. It is said that he is building his fences well, and that he has been assured the Pottsville delegation provided he can deliver certain support to a candidate for national delegate in that town.

There are so many factions of the Republican party at the county seat, that it is a difficult matter for a candidate for national delegate to keep in the good graces of them all. But the gallant Major Flincy appears equal to the task, and in this respect is an adept.

There is much speculation as to the outcome of the Mercantile Appraisership contest. Nothing definite will be known in the matter until it is settled which two of the Commissioners will organize this time. Commissioner Martin's choice is George Woll, the Minersville Democrat, while John D. Kershner is being strongly urged upon Mr. Allen by Tanqua politicians. Councilman McElhenny's friends, and they are legion, are pressing his claims upon the Commissioners. It would be gratifying to the Republicans, as well as Democrats, to see the appointment come here.

The Farmers' Protest.

The farmers of Washington, Wayne and both Mahanoy townships, as announced in these columns, held a public meeting Saturday afternoon to protest against the mismanagement at the county silo-house, and a reduction in the salary list. H. S. Warrick, of Wayne, presided, and James A. Kershner acted as secretary. The principal speaker was August Knecht, editor of the American-Kautcher Republican, and the business of the meeting was conducted in the German language. A committee was appointed to draw up resolutions, which will contain advice as to the best system for conducting the business and suggest remedies against the growing evils at that institution. The committee will meet next Thursday.

A Street Fight.

A large crowd was attracted by a fight on the pavement in front of Holderman's jewelry store, at about half past nine o'clock Saturday night, and for a time the show window of the store was in danger of being wrecked.

Policeman Lee arrived and, forcing his way through the crowd, caught hold of John Young and William Saggets, two Poles, who were striking at two men who succeeded in getting away. Upon being taken before Justice Williams the Poles said they were walking along Lloyd street, between Javlin and Main, when they met William Becker and Peter Dillman, who insisted upon having a fight. They followed the Poles to Main street and attacked them. Young was pretty badly cut and bruised. Upon the statement Policeman Lee, armed with a warrant, went in search of Becker and Dillman and arrested them. They were drunk. A glass was taken from the pocket of one of them in the Justice's office after a little scuffle. Their actions and statement practically confirmed the stories told by the Poles and they were committed for trial at court in default of \$300 bail, each, but subsequently the bail was furnished. Young was discharged, but Saggets was fined \$2 and costs for being unruly on the way to the Justice's office and causing a disturbance while there.

A collection was taken up to pay him for the trouble and expense he had been put to in taking the team to Pottsville and it amounted to a little over nine dollars. At the appointed time he started for home, leaving his team behind to play in case Minersville should succeed in getting in shape, and the game was not declared off until some time after he had left the grounds. Mr. Fahy says he had nothing to do with the box receipts and his action in the matter was perfectly straight.


