ASSAULTED IN COURT.

A Woman Kicks and Punches Jackson, the Alleged Murderer, AND IT FRIGHTENS THE PRISONER.

He Seemed to Fear a Hostile Outbreak on the Part of Those Assembled in the Court Room—The Case Postponed for Two Weeks.

NEWPORT, Ky., April 8.—Scott Jackson, the alleged murderer of Pearl Bryan, was before Judge Helm yesterday for trial. Upon the application of his attorneys the judge postponed the hearing until Tuesday, April 21.

The grounds set forth by Colonel Crawford in his application for a postponement were, first, illness in his family, which had prevented him giving proper attention to the case, and second, inability to secure depositions of witnesses residing at a distance. The attorney for the prosecution made no serious objections to the application.

The court said that the object stated by Colonel Crawford was not in itself a sufficient cause for granting a continuance, but in order to give ample time to the defense to prepare its case he would make the postponement desired.

As Jackson was leaving the court room he passed in front of a woman sitting in the front row of seats. He looked down at her smiling, when the woman suddenly delivered a vicious kick at the prisoner, and as he passed beyond her she was heard to say: "I would have killed him if I could. If I had had a pistol I would have shot him."

But for the fact that the spectators were admitted on tickets, and that the incident was not widely observed there might have been trouble. There were about 180 spectators outside the bar. Of women there were not more than twelve. Mrs. McCann, of Falmouth, Ky., the woman who kicked Jackson, also gave him a vicious punch in the stomach with her fist. She remarked: "It's a shame to put off his trial; he ought to be hanged right away," and she added, "I'd like to help hang him myself."

Jackson looked more serious and showed more perturbation than he did at any previous appearance in court. He seemed to be thoroughly frightened, as though fearing an outbreak on the part of those assembled.

Attorneys for the prosecution doubt very much whether the defense will try to prove a good character for Jackson. The most probable course will be to attack the character of the negro George H. Jackson and William Wood, of Greencastle, Pearl Bryan's cousin, both of whom will be witnesses for the state.

New Jersey Prisoners Pardoned.

TRENTON, April 8.—The state board of pardons yesterday pardoned several prisoners and paroled others. Those pardoned were Joseph Green, sentenced in 1892 to five years for grand larceny; William Levy, sentenced in 1894 to three and a half years for forgery; William A. Cox, sentenced in 1898 to three years for larceny; Patrick McMahon, sentenced in 1900 to nine months for conspiracy; Lewis Asay and Morris Ford, sentenced in 1896 to fifteen months for stealing a cow. The Fords were also restored to citizenship, as were also Robert Snyder, sentenced in 1890 to two years for arson, and Henry H. Heater, sentenced in 1896 to five years for breaking and entering. Those paroled were William Buckley, sentenced in 1890 to ten years for rape; Samuel B. Williams, sentenced in 1895 to eighteen months for bigamy. Fines which had been imposed in addition to time sentences were remitted in a number of cases.

The Red Cross Unmolested.

NEW YORK, April 8.—The following cablegram was received by Spencer Trask yesterday from Miss Clara Barton, president of the Red Cross society, who is in charge of the relief work in Armenia: "Source of typhoid and other diseases from starvation and exposure unabated. Red Cross reports just received from our expeditions, which are meeting with splendid success. No obstructions nor Turkish surveillance, as has been wrongly reported. Every facility offered. Welcomed everywhere. One party working between Marsh, Zetoun, Malatia and Harpoot. The other between Orfa, Diarbark and Harpoot. Visiting towns and villages on route. Giving assistance where most needed."

Failed to Dislodge the Derivishes.

ROME, April 8.—A dispatch from Massawa reports that after Colonel Stevani's victory over the derivishes near Kassala on Saturday, in a battle in which he lost a hundred men and inflicted a loss estimated at 600 upon the derivishes, he returned to Kassala and the derivishes retired to the forts and entrenchments at Turuf. On the following day Colonel Stevani vigorously attacked the forts. He captured some of them, but was unable to entirely dislodge the derivishes. He therefore returned to Kassala, and General Baidassora ordered him to retire with his column upon Agordat, half way between Kassala and Massawa.

Run Down by an Ocean Liner.

NEW YORK, April 8.—While proceeding to sea last night the steamship Belgard, bound for South American ports, came into collision, near Quarantine, with the Red Star line steamship Friesland, and was so badly injured that she was beached at Staten Island to prevent sinking, with fourteen feet of water in her hold. No one on board either vessel was injured. The Friesland proceeded to her dock apparently only slightly damaged.

Allen Not a Presidential Candidate.

OMAHA, April 8.—Senator W. V. Allen yesterday addressed a letter to Governor Holcomb declining to be a candidate on the Populist ticket for presidential honors. He explained that others in the party deserved the recognition and his business would not permit of such an arrangement. In Nebraska it has been generally understood that Allen was a presidential candidate.

The Elections in Kansas.

TOPEKA, April 8.—Returns from cities of the second class where there was any opposition to the Republican ticket show Republican victories in some places over fusion tickets. In many places the issue was the "joint" question, and so far the temperance sentiment is victorious, irrespective of party.

A Recently Appointed Judge Dead.

TRENTON, April 8.—Governor Griggs yesterday received a telegram announcing the death of James F. Conklin, who was recently appointed law judge of Sussex county.

Weyler's Futile Efforts Against the Determined Insurgents.

DESPITE MANY REPORTED DEFEATS

The Fighting Cubans Keep the Troops Busy in Defending the Settlements Entrusted to Their Care, While Laying Waste the Property of Those Who Oppose Them.

HAVANA, April 8.—The insurgents have plundered and burned three stores at San Pedro, province of Pinar del Rio. The news was conveyed to the nearest Spanish commander, and a force of cavalry was sent in pursuit of the enemy. The troops overtook the insurgents near the city of Pinar del Rio, and killed six of them. The insurgents under Bandera recently surprised a detachment of Spanish troops at night by advancing upon the latter's outposts and cheering for Spain. But the troops, consisting of the guerrilla of the village of Consuelacion and the garrison of the town Del Norte, soon found out the deception and opened fire upon the insurgents. The latter, however, threw the place into a panic and succeeded in burning five stores before they were beaten off.

The engagement lasted about three hours. The insurgents left twenty-nine killed in the streets, and in the morning the troops sent out to reconnoiter found sixty newly made graves of insurgents, and it is supposed that the latter retired with many wounded.

Lieutenant Commander Juan Cervera, of the Spanish gunboat Alvarado, cruising along the coast of Baracoa, province of Santiago de Cuba, saw a number of boats containing insurgents trying to hide in the swamps near Port Maraví. The Alvarado opened fire upon the enemy, who jumped out of their boats and succeeded in gaining the shore, from whence they returned the gunboat's fire. The guns and the Mauser fire of the gunboats soon silenced the insurgents, who eventually fled.

Delayed advices received here from Vinales say that Maceo attacked the village of Palma, near that place, on March 29, and succeeded in entering the place. He plundered a number of stores and approached a church which had been converted into a fort. The insurgents, however, were repulsed with the loss of thirty-nine killed and withdrew, taking with them the corpses of as many more killed and ninety wounded. The garrison lost six killed and seventeen wounded.

There have been several skirmishes recently in the province of Pinar del Rio, in addition to those already reported, during which five insurgents were killed and one was captured.

The column of troops from the Rey battalion, operating in the province of Pinar del Rio, has found a repository of insurgent arms and ammunition in the Iris plantation.

General Altamora, leading three columns of troops along the roads in the vicinity of Ciego de Avila, drove in a number of insurgents, killed six of them, and captured two prisoners. One soldier was killed and three were wounded during the operations.

The insurgents have burned the village of Pijirigu, in Pinar del Rio, to the number of sixty houses. They also burned 3,000 tons of sugar cane at the central plantation of Reforma, in the Remedios district, and 1,000 cords of wood, to the value altogether of \$150,000. They were repulsed by the forces before they were able to burn the machinery of the plantation.

At the opening of his remarks Commander Booth-Tucker mentioned the fact that he had been down to the city hall to give notice of his intention to become a proper American. This information was cheered, and the band played "Yankee Doodle."

The Threatened New York Strike.

NEW YORK, April 8.—President Mahon, of the Amalgamated Association of Street Railway Employees, yesterday wrote a letter to President Wooland, of the Metropolitan Traction company, asking for a conference. Mr. Wooland sent a reply saying that none of the employees were discharged for belonging to the association, and that no conference was therefore necessary. President Mahon has not as yet decided to call a strike, but it is expected that he will do so if the company officials persist in maintaining their present attitude.

The Ram Katabdin a Success.

NEW LONDON, Conn., April 8.—The Ammen ram Katabdin returned at 6:30 o'clock last night from her twelve hour trial trip at sea. The machinery of the vessel worked perfectly, and the members of the trial board finished their day's work well satisfied that the builders had fulfilled their contract as far as good workmanship and material were concerned. The board will recommend a few minor improvements, but these will not be due to any fault of the builders.


